Nationalization of Entire Supply of Yellow Metal in Country Urged by Chief Executive-Leaving Silver Alone For Time Being at Least

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 15: (CP) - President Franklin D. Rocsevelt, in a special message to Congress today, recommended a minimum cut of forty percent in the gold content of the dollar and asked for nationalization of the entire gold supply of the country. Because of January 15 (Canadian Press) The "world uncertainties," the president refrained from fix-

wing the exact status for the dollar at this time but he made it clear that he was holding to his "commodity plan."


