## TRAGEDY DETAILS

### Believed Philip Ivanovitch Took His Own Life in Remorse After Accidentally Shooting Steve Zadoronzy

Further particulars of the double tragedy of the past week in the Pineview district of the Prince George area in which Steve Zadoronzy and Philip Ivanovitch are both dead of bullet wounds have been received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. Zadoronzy is believed to have been shot while picking berries in mistake for an animal, possibly a bear, by Ivanovitch who a few days later, in remorse, committed suicide by turning the weapon upon himself.

According to the police report, Zadoronzy went berry picking on Sunday, August 12, and, after he had failed to return home, the son

reported that he was missing. Search parties, under police direction, were sent out. On Friday, August 17, Ivanovitch committed suicide by shooting himself.

Ivanovitch, who had taken part in the search for Zadoronzy, was questioned closely by the police after it had been reported that he had been seen carrying a rifle on the day that Zadoronzy became missing. Following this questioning, it is believed that he shot himself.

It had not been uncommon for Ivanovitch to carry a rifle as he was known to be afraid of bears. He had been known to shoot at stumps in mistake for bears.

Zadoronzy's body was found on Saturday morning in a berry patch ten feet off the trail not far from Ivanovitch's homestead. There was a bullet wound in his body and twenty-five yards from the body was found a discharged 38-55 cartridge. Ivanovitch had used a 38-55 rifle in shooting himself.

The police have little doubt that Ivanovitch shot Zadoronzy accidentally and later took his own life. The theory of murder is discounted.

## CAPTAIN SPEAKER

Commander of H. M. S. Danae Gives Address to Toc H

Quite a large gathering of Toc H members and friends assembled last night in the rooms on Second Avenue to welcome Capt. C. H. Knox-Little, R.N., Commander of H. M. S. Danae, and Lieutenant Commander M. G. Goodenough, R.N. The rooms were tastefully decorated with flowers and national flags. P. H. Linzey, the Toc H pilot, after the singing of "O Canada," opened with the ceremony of "Light" and then, in a few well chosen remarks, introduced the speaker.

The Captain's address was very instructive and inspiring. He described what Toc H was accomplishing in the Old Country. While this was the first time he had addressed a Toc H unit, Captain Knox-Little said he was well acquainted with the splendid work that was being done throughout the British Empire by Toc H under the enthusiastic inspiration of its patron, the Prince of Wales. Its foundation was laid on comradeship and service. One of the most important "jobs" that was being done in Great Britain, was the taking under their wing of the unemployed, more especially the younger generation. Camps, clubs and various educational facilities, both mental and physical, had been organized by Toc H and were doing wonderful work in keeping these young jobless through the depression.

At the close of his address Captain Knox-Little said he had great pleasure in presenting the Prince Rupert Group with one of the ship's flags which was in the Toc H colors, black and gold, as a token of that comradeship upon which Toc H was founded. This was greeted with enthusiastic applause. The Captain also mentioned that, on their return trip south, the ship would call at Alert Bay and he would meet there Rev. O. T. Hodgson, Commander of the Royal Navy, who is honorary padre of Prince Rupert Group Toc H.

During the evening John E. Davey rendered some very pleasing solos, accompanied by Mrs. J. S. Black. A hearty vote of thanks, proposed by City Commissioner W. J. Alder and seconded by J. D. Allen, was enthusiastically endorsed.

## DINNER TO DELEGATES

Necessity of Co-operation and Unity Of Communities of District Is Stressed by Speakers

### Improvement Seen

Progress Has Been Made During Past Year and Outlook For Future Definitely Better

The necessity of continued co-operation and unity of the various communities of the north coast and central interior in facing the problems of the district and working for the development and future prosperity of this section of the province was stressed by speakers at the dinner tendered in the Commodore Cafe last night to delegates to the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of British Columbia. The dinner was the first event in connection with the holding of the convention, business sessions of which opened this morning in the city council chamber. Speakers also referred to the valuable role the Associated Boards could play in striving for the advancement of the northern and central areas of the province provided it worked in a common cause with the interests of the district as a whole, rather than for particular parts of it, at heart.

The dinner was presided over by C. V. Evitt, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, in the absence of the president, John Dybhavn. Speakers included City Commissioner W. J. Alder, L. B. Warner, Olof Hanson M.P., E. T. Kenney M.L.A. and Harry Bowman. There were about fifty present.

In opening the proceedings, Mr. Evitt welcomed the delegates and bespoke success and results for the convention proceedings.

Commissioner Alder extended a civic welcome to the delegates. He urged unity on the part of the various communities in working for general advancement of the district which he claimed was as potential from the standpoint of natural resources as any in British Columbia. Resolutions passed at last year's convention in Smithers had been productive of good results. Progress had been made in the way of placing interior products on the Prince Rupert market but there was much more that might be accomplished along this line.

Mr. Warner, who is president of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia, told of the industrial revival that had set in in this district since last year. All the industries, mining, lumbering, fishing and agriculture, were feel-


