ENGLAND IS READY--AND WAITS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

London, July 29.—With steam up on her fleet of battleships, and with armed troops, both regular and militia, moving steadily towards all the important strategic positions in the country, Britain is today waiting for a possible clash with Germany over the Moroccan situation.

England's position has been positively outlined, and no more can be done until the France-German negotiations over Morocco have been disposed of. The outcome of the dangerous situation hinges on whether Germany will withdraw her ships from Moroccan ports.

Diplomats are watching every move with strained attention, and concede that France cannot grant Germany's demand. They expect that warned by the evidences of British determination and of apparent certainty that France will stand firm, the Kaiser and his ministers tonight will agree to grant concessions.

The whole situation in a nutshell is that Germany has made demands which have not been granted by France, and which, should France weaken, would still be opposed by England.

Germany must back down or fight. Which alternative the Kaiser will take is uncertain. England is ready--and waits.
