## Business Outward from Fraser River for Year to Date Beats Record

Total Tonnage Shows Ten Percent Increase Over 1933 While Lumber Shipping Also Records Substantial Gain

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 14:- Exports for the first six months of 1934 from this port set a new all time record for volume, according to a report just issued by the New Westminster Harbor Board. Exports totalled 350,000 tons or an increase of 30,000 tons over the same period last year.

Lumber exports for the period totalled 111,111,371 board feet as compared with 108,150,560 board feet in the first six months of last year.
