### FRANK DIBB BOARD HEAD

Library Directors Have Inaugural Session—Mrs. G. H. Arnold Chairman of Book Committee

The new Prince Rupert Public Library board held its inaugural meeting last night when Frank Dibb was chosen chairman and Thomas B. Black was re-appointed as secretary. The book committee for the year consists of Mrs. G. H. Arnold, chairman, W. H. Tobey and R. L. McLennan.

The chairman extended a welcome to the new members of the board. Those present were Mrs. Arnold, Mr. Dibb, Mr. Tobey, Mr. McLennan, Mr. Black and Miss A. D. Cruikshank, the librarian.

A letter from S. J. Jabour, chairman of the library patrons committee, informed the board that organization of the drive for funds for new books was proceeding. It was decided to send letters of appreciation to various organizations taking part in the drive.

A communication from the deputy provincial secretary stated that at present it did not appear as if it would be possible to reinstate library grants.

Decision was made to spend \$50 for new books in the duplicate pay section.

#### Librarian's Report

The report of the librarian showed a total of 5099 books loaned during the month of February—3534 fiction, 615 non-fiction, 63 duplicate pay and 887 juvenile. The average per day for the twenty days the library was open was 254.9 books. Eighteen new borrowers were listed during the month with fifteen cancelled, making the total number of library users 3782 or three more than the previous month.

During the month 75 new books had been acquired by gift while 51 had been discarded, making a total of 8797 books on the shelves—24 more than in the month previous.

### WATERFRONT STORY HERE

Novel and Exciting Drama Presented on Screen of Capitol This Mid-Week

### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening to be withdrawn from service for annual overhaul at the local dry dock. Sailing on schedule at 10:15 tomorrow night for Ocean Falls, Powell River and Vancouver, the Prince George, which has been undergoing repairs and annual overhaul here, will take over the service with Capt. H. E. Nedden in command. Capt. McLean will transfer from the Prince Rupert to the Prince John which is due here tonight or early tomorrow morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. Capt. Edward Mabbs, at present in command of the Prince John, going over to the Prince George as chief officer. The Prince George was out in the harbor this morning for trial runs.


