United States Senate Refuses To Give Its Approval to Waterway

Vote Was 46 to 42 or More Than Twelve Short of Two-Thirds Necessary to Ratify—Roosevelt Had Supported Bennett-Hoover Pact

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 14: (CP)—By a vote of 46 to 42, the United States Senate today refused to ratify the St. Lawrence waterway treaty negotiated by Premier R. B. Bennett and Former President Herbert Hoover and supported by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The vote was more than a dozen short of the two-thirds necessary to ratify.
