Member For Peace River Speaks of The Peace River and Politics at Rotary Club Luncheon

When the people of Prince Rupert want anything they should get together and speak with one voice, not have various factions and groups and individuals importuning the government in regard to matters affecting the province. They should avoid parochial action and think nationally. That was part of the advice given in an address to the Rotary Club yesterday by Clive Planta, M.L.A. for Peace River, who gave an intensely interesting intimate discourse on politics and the Peace River at the weekly luncheon in the Commodore Cafe.

Mr. Planta dissolved the illusion that the Peace River section was one of the prosperous parts of the country. He told his audience that many of the people there were struggling hard to make a living and that a large number had been receiving relief from the government. Only in the older settled sections was there real prosperity.

While the whole Peace River district comprised something like 39,000,000 acres the Peace River Block in British Columbia had 3,000,000 acres of which about a million were good arable land, accessible to settlements or to the railway. The country was deeply cut by rivers, the Peace being more than 1000 feet below the prairie and the Beaton 700 feet with cliffs on either side. Water and transportation were the chief problems of the settlers. Ice was used for drinking water and in the lakes there were few fish.

The speaker recounted the history of the settlement of the area, many hundreds going in there with no funds and no other possessions. Much of the land being wooded it took many years to get a start. The country was one of the most cosmopolitan in Canada, and party lines were not esteemed.

In his election campaign Mr. Planta said he had conducted it contrary to all the rules of party politics. He had no organization, made no promises and paid for no services. The Peace River member told of his experiences in Victoria after being elected and why he had supported the government of the day. He ridiculed the system under which one party was elected to rule and the other to prevent them ruling. He said he believed that there were only two systems ahead, either that of extreme radicalism or that of managed control. He stated very clearly that he was not a Liberal but was pledged to independence during the life of this Legislature. In federal politics he was a Conservative.

At the conclusion of the address Mr. Planta received an ovation and also was formally thanked by the president, J. J. Little, for his extremely interesting address.
