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OPTIMISM RAMPANT

The news columns of this paper yesterday seemed to be a good example of optimism rampant. Olier Besner told of improved prospects for a greatly desired pulp mill. M. P. McCaffery announced in Vancouver that the scheme for erecting a new cold storage plant had been completed and work would commence very soon. The manager of the reduction plant arrived to reopen the meal and oil factory on Prince Rupert Harbor. John Dybhavn announced that a healthy halibut situation was being created by the clearing out of old stocks. This was not a bad list for one day. It is in line with the trend of the times, which is toward renewed business activity. Add to that the renewed mining activity and we have pretty nearly the whole picture. It is a very pleasing picture for Prince Rupert people after several years of the doldrums.

REVIVAL IN TIMBER INDUSTRY

There is a distinct revival in the timber industry, due to some extent, at least, to the policy of the federal government at the Imperial Conference at Ottawa. Yesterday Mr. Besner told of two thousand men going to the logging camps from Vancouver and thus helping to relieve the unemployment situation. On the Queen Charlotte Islands alone a thousand men will be busy getting out logs for the mills. Very soon we shall be hearing of activity along the line of the Canadian National Railway which will round out the list of activities for Northern and Central B.C.

PRINCE RUPERT'S INFLUENCE

It was the action of Prince Rupert in returning to Victoria the same member over a period of about seventeen years that resulted eventually in all the premiers of Canada being called together at Ottawa for the conference which is now taking place and at which momentous issues are being discussed. This city will take a personal interest in the outcome because of the local member being the leading factor in calling the conference together. Mr. Pattullo undoubtedly is the leading figure there and local people, irrespective of whether they supported him or not at the election, will hope that he succeeds in getting at least a fair proportion of the things he went after.
