MILLENIUM COMING

the Line is Through Four years hence, in 1815, the kingdoms of this world are to be shattered, according to Mr. A. I. Ritchie, who addressed a convention in Toronto recently. The speaker dealt with the significance of the "seventh day of rest," which is mentioned in Genesis, from the chronological viewpoint. "History," he said, "both Biblical and secular, tends to show that the actual length of the 'seventh day' referred to in the Bible is 7,000 years, and that of these close on 6,000 have passed.
