WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Daily Payroll at Dry Dock Now \$750—Fisheries Commission Schooner Eagle Calls Here—Thieving Along Waterfront Reported

There are now 155 men on the payroll at the local dry dock and it is estimated that about \$750 daily is being paid out in wages which is just about ten times the normal payroll of late. The beneficial effect of same, as might be expected, is being felt by the whole community. The repair job of the steamer Prince George, the main source of employment, will last for at least another month, then the Prince Rupert will have annual overhaul and there will be considerable work on fishing vessels, thus nicely bridging over the gap between now and the opening of the season's fishing activities. It was a great depression while it lasted!

The big Petersburg halibut schooner Mitkof, Capt. Sverre Johansen, is at Seattle where a new 175 h.p. Fairbanks-Morse diesel engine is being installed. The Mitkof, well known at Prince Rupert, has been in Seattle ever since the close of the 1933 season and will be ready for sea by the time 1934 operations commence.

Capt. Egil Erickson and Isak Laksvog have a new 77.3-foot halibut schooner under construction in Seattle, the launching having taken place recently at the Sunde & Olsen yard. She is to be named Sunde as was her predecessor. With beam of 18 feet, 10 inches and depth of nine feet, two inches, the vessel will be equipped with a 130 h.p. Atlas diesel engine. Capt. Erickson is well known at Prince Rupert.

The Hoover, Capt. Nick Alvare, sharing \$1875 per man, was high boat of the Seattle halibut fleet for the 1933 season. The Sentinel, Capt. C. P. Sunderland, topped the Ketchikan fleet with shares of \$1255.

Where man failed, nature has stepped in and halted a plague of giant crabs that was threatening the fishing industry on the Victorian coast of Australia. Some months ago, crabs three feet wide were found lying on the sea bed for 22 miles round the coast at Corner Inlet, not far from Melbourne. Pear-shaped, spiky-backed and light strawberry in color, these huge crabs have now been found by scientists to be dying of a bacterial infection. The infection, it is thought, gained access to the tissues through holes in the shells. Owing to shortage of food and their subsequent poor condition, the crabs were attacked by boring algae, and through the weak spots in the armour the bacteria entered and is completing the work.

Thieving from a number of boats along the local waterfront is re-

ported of late. One of the latest boats to be pilfered is the "Islay" which was visited by intruders last week-end at the east end of the elevator wharf and a number of articles removed.

After having spent over three weeks engaged in scientific research operations on the halibut grounds in the neighborhood of Queen Charlotte Islands, the big Seattle halibut schooner Eagle, Capt. Jacob Engdal, arrived in Prince Rupert on Wednesday afternoon and, after outfitting, sailed at midnight Friday for Seward enroute to Gulf of Alaska waters where it is expected she will spend three weeks before proceeding to Seattle. The Eagle has been under charter to the International Commission for use in scientific work since last fall. Richard Van Cleeve was at first in charge of the scientific party on board but has been recently ashore at Seward engaged in special halibut hatchery, John L. Kask having been in charge for the past month of scientific operations from the Eagle.

Having not left Vancouver until 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, 12 hours behind schedule, and losing further time during the voyage up the coast, Union steamer Venture, Capt. E. Georgeson, reached port
