Beer Exceeding 3.2 Percent and Spirits Illegal in Territory

Any Shipments of Such Beverages Are Subject to Seizure And Confiscation, District Attorney Kehoe Announces

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 3: (CP)-United States District Attorney Joseph W. Kehoe yesterday warned Pacific Coast shippers and Alaskan dealers that the Volstead Act is still effective in Alaska and that any shipments of beer exceeding 3.2 percent strength or spirits into the territory are subject to seizure and confiscation.
