DUTY OF THE STATE

In view of the rapacity of some, it becomes necessary for the state to intervene to protect those who are at a disadvantage. It is indication of a healthy condition of the body politic when the Prime Minister of Canada and the prime ministers of most of the provinces and also the prospective prime minister are all agreed on the general principle of protecting the weak from the strong through legislation and governmental action. It is not a new policy but is being extended in new directions. Such legislation as the various factory acts, the laws restricting hours of labor, the sacredness of holidays, the minimum wage laws all are examples of state intervention. The difficulty is that laws are not always enforced and some of them are not workable. An aroused public opinion, will gradually bring about better conditions. People have to be educated individually and in the mass in order that they may be brought to a realization of the needs of humanity.
