WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Salmon Trollers on Queen Charlotte Islands Having Big Harvest—Salvage Princess Back From Islands—Naas Fishing Better Than Skeena

Salmon trollers around Seven Mile Point and Shag Rocks are having one of the biggest harvests in years. A fine run of cohoes and springs in continuing after having been on for the last ten days or so. All boats are doing well and, in some cases, there have been handsome financial returns, all of which is helping to make up for the recent

lean times. There are some 200 boats fishing on the Massett grounds and on some days they have been averaging 1000 pounds with some of the larger boats getting as high as 1800 pounds or so. At North Island no records have yet been broken although there has been fair fishing. The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. is packing Massett salmon to its plant here, the Canadian Fishing Co. is taking it at Butedale and deliveries are being made to New Westminster for Edmunds and Walker. The Massett Cannery are also packing cohoes at Old Massett Cannery, having so far put up over 2000 cases.

The Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess, Capt. Joe Desmules, under charter to the Nootka Packing Co. for salmon packing to New Massett cannery, arrived in port early this morning from the Islands, bringing Manager Ferguson of the Massett Cannery who may take seine fish from the mainland pending the commencement of the Massett pink run which should develop within the

next few days. From here the Princess will go to the Naas River. **Skeena and Naas Rivers** Fishing on the Skeena has not been quite as good this week as last. Averages to the boat of sockeye yesterday were twenty-five but there were few fish in the river itself. The result was that practically all the fishing was done outside. It was feared that the fire at Claxton would interfere with the activities of the B. C. Packers but it is satisfactory to know that they will be operating the cannery again Monday after a temporary stoppage.

The Naas River has been giving better results than the Skeena. Yesterday fishermen took an average of 40 fish to the boat. Pinks are showing up in increasing numbers on both the Naas and Skeena. Cohoes are being taken at all the trolling grounds as well as springs.
