While most of the churches seem to have pretty well abolished hell from their geographies, they still cling to the heaven of ease and comfort where there will be nothing but pure enjoyment.

It is anything but inspiring to the modern individual this heaven of ease. People today do not work so hard that they want to rest throughout eternity. People who have striven hard here and have enjoyed the strife would be altogether out of place in a heaven of ease. They want action.

The value of a church to a community is measured by the inspiration it gives to its members and to the people of the whole community. If the members are men and women who do nothing outstanding, who make no mark in the community in which they live, who do not impress their characters and characteristics on the neighbors and who are inactive in the cause of improvement, then it is pretty sure it is a church in which the heaven of ease and comfort is the ideal and nothing can be expected of it.

The need of the day is for centres of inspiration. They may be churches or they may be other organizations or groups. Today as never before real leaders are needed with high ideals who will with good judgment crystallize modern thought. If religion is still an active force it should be able to inspire people to tackle the problems of the day and work them out for the benefit of the world. If it is not an active force it will rapidly pass into oblivion.
