### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

A sharp falling off in tourist traffic was evidenced in the passenger list of C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, which was in port on Saturday northbound from Vancouver to Skagway. The vessel had 114 passengers on board and the large majority of these were local passengers for Alaska points including a number of school teachers for Juneau and Ketchikan. Seven persons disembarked from the vessel here while but one boarded her here for the north. The Princess Louise, which was in port from 10:30 a.m. to noon Saturday, is due here again Thursday afternoon southbound. She is making the last tourist schedule sailing but will remain in service for two or three more voyages on fall schedule before being replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah.

Completing the company's final voyage of the season on the Alaska route, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 9 o'clock yesterday morning from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. The vessel had 135 passengers aboard on her arrival here, sixteen disembarking at this port.

Having been delayed by heavy freights for cannery points, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, did not arrive in port until 11 o'clock Sunday night from the south, sailing at 1:10 a.m. for Anxox. Stewart and other northern points whence she returned at 1:15 this afternoon southbound. The vessel brought north a capacity list of passengers including many school teachers for city and district as well as families returning north after having spent the summer vacation in the south.
