



Although photo at top was taken in Upper Austria on February 14, 1934, it has just reached Canada. It shows six Austrian Socialists facing a Fascist firing squad shortly after the Socialist rebellion of that time. The recent Nazi revolt ended in a similar manner for many enemies o the preent regime. At centre is seen a machine-gun nest of heimwehr guarding a building in Vienna after the uprising that cost Chancellor Dollfuss his life. The photo was flown from Vienna to London and radioed across the Atlantic.

An exclusive photograph, at bottom, telephotoed to London and radioed from there to New York, whence it was flown, showing the late Chancellor Engelbert Dollfust of Austria lying in state in the office of the chancellery after ne had been shot to death by Austrian Nazias. Suspicion that Germany approved of the assassination shocked Europe and for a time caused new fears of war.
