THAT KIDNAPPING CASE

Evidently Canada cannot afford to throw stones at the United States over her kidnapping cases and crime administration generally. In a sparsely inhabited country like ours it is much more difficult to hide criminal operations than in a country like the United States. Yet we find that, even in Prince Rupert district, perpetrators of murders are still at large. In Vancouver a girl was murdered in the best residential district and the perpetrator was never punished. Other crimes have escaped detection and now a kidnapping has been carried out boldly as if in defiance of the Canadian police.

We are evidently much like our neighbors to the south, no better and no worse. Usually we are a little more speedy in our criminal courts but our civil courts are not noted for their speed. We shall have to stop taking the pharisaical attitude and forget to say to Uncle Sam as we so often do: "I am holier than thou."

PROUD OF BRITISH CONNECTION

We are all proud of our British connection. We like to see the Navy here. There is a sense of security under the British flag but we must not hulk ourselves into a feeling of false security. The British Navy is not always here and when the big ships are absent all we have is two police boats, the Skeena and the Vancouver. It does not help us much to have a fleet of warships on the Atlantic, if we should be attacked, as we well might have been during the late war.

The history of the Canadian Navy is something like this: Sir Wilfrid Laurier years ago offered as Canada's contribution to defence of the Empire to start the development of a Canadian Navy.

Two training vessels were secured from Britain, manned at first by British officers and crew which were gradually replaced by Canadians. Then plans were laid for building in Canada some of the smaller warcraft. Tenders were called and figures submitted. But just about that time an election was held and Laurier and his party were defeated. The new Conservative administration cancelled the shipbuilding contracts, disposed of the training ships and introduced a bill into Parliament providing for a cash contribution to the British Navy. It passed the Commons but was defeated in the Senate and since that time little has been heard of the Canadian Navy except the provision of one or two destroyers to act as police boats.

The Naval Reserve and Sea Cadets still carry on and the Navy League does its best to fan the flame of naval value to the country but there has been little popular response throughout the country and no political party has suggested reviving the attempt to build a Canadian navy. The government has not been in a position for some years past to pay even its ordinary running expenses without adding to those expenses by keeping up a navy.

Helen Jacobs Defeats Sarah Palfrey To Capture U. S. Tennis Title

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 20.—Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Cal., won the women's national tennis championship for the third successive year yesterday, conquering little Sarah Palfrey of Brookline, Mass., with vicious chop shots and spinners. She became the third player to win the championship three straight years, equalling the records of Molla Mallory and Helen Wills Moody.

Miss Jacobs' victory gained her permanent possession of the championship challenge cup.

Miss Jacobs and Miss Palfrey won the doubles title.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

There was some stir on the Canadian National wharf Friday afternoon as H. M. S. Danae was tying up when one of the sailors slipped on a sandpile on the dock and fell off the wharf into the harbor. He was fished out without suffering any injury or ill-effects.

The twin-motored Boeing flying boat, which is accompanying the yacht Taconite on a cruise in northern waters, was in port Friday morning, going out again at 12.30 noon. The pilot is Clayton L. Scott, well known northern flier. The flying boat made a trip last week to Burns Lake district on angling bent with W. E. Boeing, Seattle ship and aircraft builder and owner of the Taconite.

With a good sized list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 7:40 last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning southbound.

Making the final weekly tourist sailing to Alaska for the company this season, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arrived in port at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 5:30 p.m. for Vancouver. Inaugurating a ten day schedule, the Princess Louise will be here next northbound on Thursday morning of this week. She will continue in service for several trips before being replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah. There were 235 passengers aboard the Louise on her arrival here from the north Saturday afternoon, seven disembarking at this port while one went south aboard her. Of the total 188 were round trip tourist passengers returning south.

H. M. S. Danae was opened to public inspection on Saturday and Sunday afternoons and the visiting light cruiser virtually swarmed with local folk on both occasions. Somehow or other, Prince Rupert people never tire of looking over naval craft and this year it was no exception to the rule. Men of the ship courteously showed the visitors about, explaining the various intricacies of the ship and its fighting equipment.
