PUGILISTS GIVE SHOW

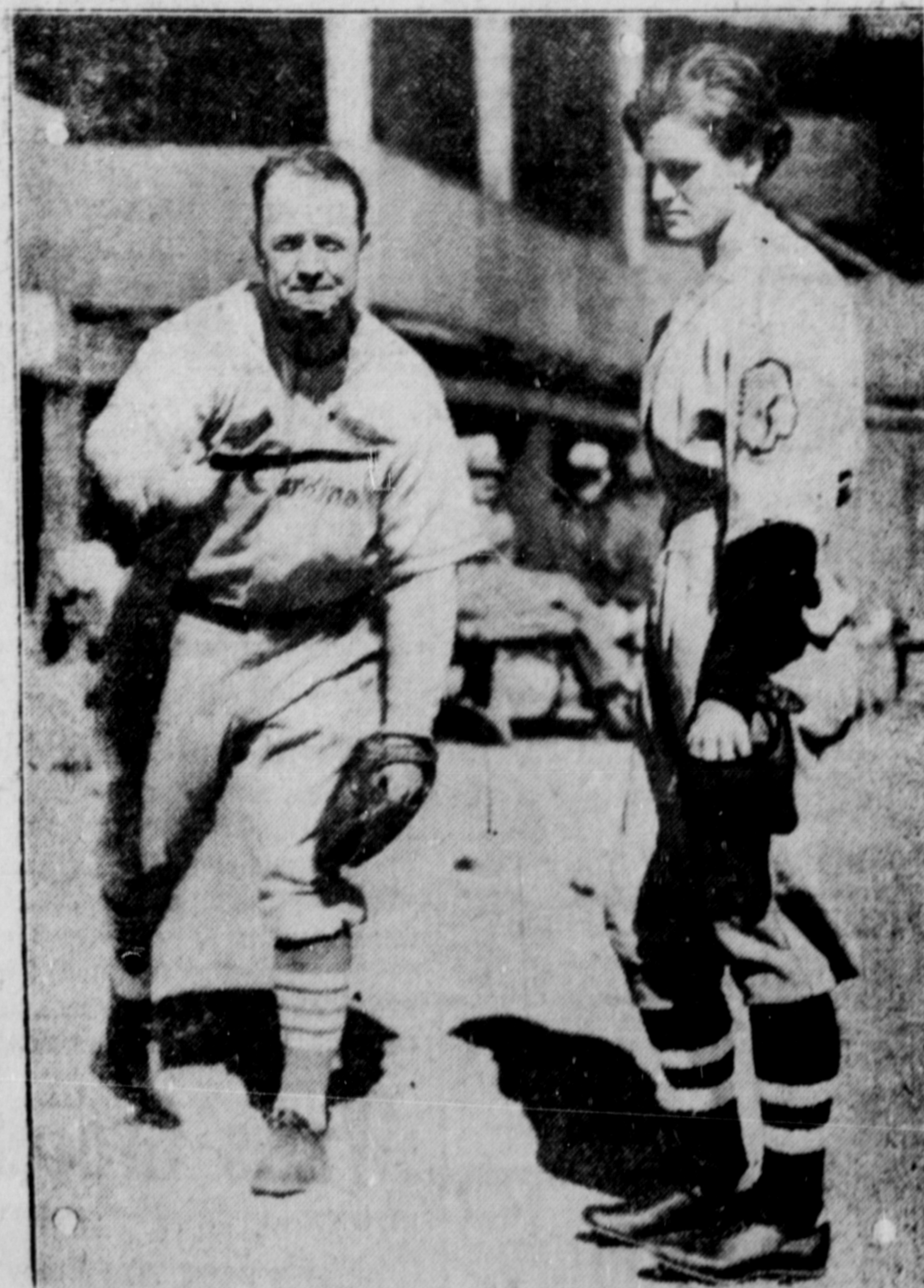
About Two Hundred Present at Moose Hall Last Night When Card is Presented For Library Fund

RAILWAY TROUBLE

Sink Hole Near Nash is Bridged—Slides at Tete Jaune Also Cause Delay

With a "sink hole" near Nash station, a short distance this side of Skeena Crossing, which had been holding up traffic for thirty-six hours, bridged, slide conditions on the Tete Jaune subdivision in the Rocky Mountains are now interfering with movement of trains on the local line of the Canadian National Railways.

The train, which was due here from the east at 10 o'clock Tuesday night, finally got in at 10:30 this morning, part of the equipment having been transferred to the train which left here for the east last evening.

Tonight's train, due at 10 p.m., was reported to be at least five hours late which means it will not be in before 3 a.m. The steamer Prince George will sail for the south on time at 10:15 tonight without waiting for the arrival of the train.

The train, which left here for the east Monday evening, was delayed for some time on account of slides in the Tete Jaune subdivision and finally a transfer of passengers, express, mail, etc. was made. The halibut shipped from here Monday, however, did not get through until today. The fish which left last evening, it was understood, would get through without delay.
