## MANY LIE RESULT OF INTENSE HEAT

## PRINCE RUPERT IS TO HAVE BIG CARNIVAL IN AUGUST

### Heat Is More Intense Than Ever In Western Central United States

DEATH TOLL MOUNTS TO 535 TODAY AND HIGHEST THERMOMETER READING IS 120 AT IOWA TOWN—100 ABOVE ZERO IS GENERAL.

CHICAGO, July 24: (CP)—The death toll mounted to 535 today as intense heat blazed down on the United States smashing records for its intensity and duration. An unofficial 120 degree temperature record at Muscatine, Iowa, was reported and readings of above 100 degrees are general throughout the central western states.

CHICAGO, July 24:—All the mid-western states are still sweltering as a result of a heat wave which is burning up the crops and making it impossible to provide feed for the stock.

NEW YORK, July 24:—Relief has come to the Atlantic states, a change of weather conditions having arrived. The barometer has dropped and cool winds are blowing in from the Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, July 24:—The highest temperature registered yesterday in the mid-western states was 117 degrees. The heat was so intense that most activities have been abandoned, the noonday siesta having become a regular feature of each day.

It is now six days since the intense heat was first felt. Yesterday there were 426 deaths from heat prostration.

Body Found in Willow River With Bullet Wound and Police Are Investigating

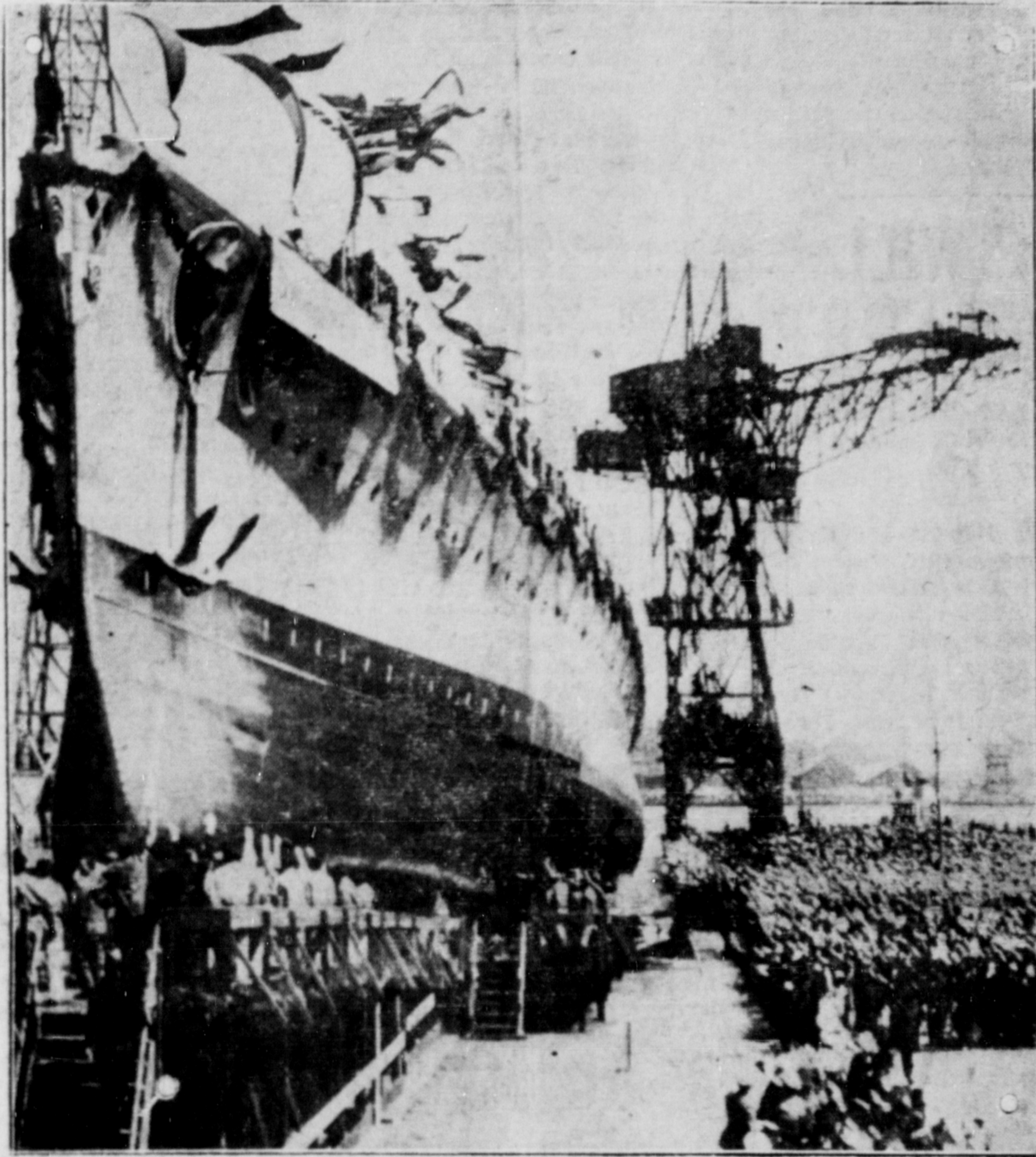
Provincial police here have been notified of the finding of the body of Ralph McVoy, a 70-year old pensioner, in the Willow River near Shelly. The body was taken to Prince George where an autopsy was held and it was found that he died from a gunshot wound evidently inflicted by some person other than himself.

McVoy had been reported missing since July 17. So far as is known he was last seen June 26. Inspector Fraser left on the train last night to take charge of further investigations.

### DILLINGER WAS POOR

Total Estate Said to be \$7.70—Sister Claims the Body and Will Bury It

CHICAGO, July 24:—John Dillinger, the bandit who was shot and killed just outside a movie theatre here Sunday night, was a poor man in spite of the large sums he had stolen. His total estate at the time of his death was \$7.70. His body is claimed by his sister who is planning to bury it at Maywood, a suburb of Minneapolis. Efforts are being made to round up members of the Dillinger gang. The police express the opinion that they will all meet the fate of their leader. Melvin Curtis, a close friend of his chief, who is one of those being sought by the police, is said to have declared that the death would be avenged.

### ROBSON IS NOT SCALED

New York Alpinist Fails to Reach Summit So Will Try Mystery Mountain

MOUNT ROBSON, July 24:—Once again has the famous pile bearing the name of Mount Robson withstood the attempts of daring climbers to reach the peak. This peak, reaching into the clouds 12,972 feet, is the highest point in the Canadian Rockies and a few days ago emerged silently victorious, with the assistance of the weather man, in a battle to reach the crown by a party of well known alpinists. Alfred E. Roover, of New York City, accompanied by Guide Hans Fuhrer, of Milwaukee, formerly a regular guide at Jasper Park Lodge and Henry Firtch, of Mount Robson, returned yesterday and reported an unsuccessful attempt to reach the top after a ten-day effort. The party reached the 11,000 foot mark but were forced to return owing to snow and weather conditions in the upper levels. Messrs. Roover and Fuhrer left over Canadian National lines yesterday for Vancouver, where they will shortly make an attempt on Mystery Mountain.

### PRESS FOR HIS PLANS

Premier Pattullo expected To Again Urge His Work and Wages Scheme On Bennett

VANCOUVER, July 24:—The British Columbia delegation headed by Premier Pattullo is planning to leave for Ottawa tomorrow. They have been called there by Premier Bennett to once more discuss the question of relief for the unemployed. The Minister of Finance, Hon. John Hart, will accompany the Premier as will also Attorney General Gordon Sloan. It is understood that Premier Pattullo will again urge upon Premier Bennett the desirability of drawing on the national credit to provide work and wages for the unemployed, carrying out highway or railway work which is at present needed and giving the men of the country an opportunity to earn a decent living.

### BOMBERS AT WHITEHORSE

Left This Morning For Fairbanks, Alaska, on Last Leg of Flight

WHITEHORSE, July 24:—The 10 United States bombers arrived here at 6:20 last evening from Prince George and honed off at eight this morning for Fairbanks on the final leg of their flight. Weather conditions were favorable. They had been previously reported passing over Stuart Lake.

### Twenty Years Ago First Step Taken Which Precipitated War In Which Canadians Took Part

Twenty years ago yesterday an uneasy world was thrown into consternation by the announcement that the Austrian minister at Belgrade had presented to the Serbian government the ultimatum which finally precipitated the war. Nearly four weeks previously—on June 28—the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir apparent to the Austrian throne, and his morganatic wife, the Duchess Sophie of Hohenberg, had been assassinated at Sarajevo by Gavril Princip, an 18-year old Bosnian student.

The wave of horror and indignation that engulfed the world immediately following this tragedy had greatly diminished, due largely to the pacific utterances of the aged Emperor Franz Joseph of Austria. (Continued on Page Four)
