NO ELECTION THIS YEAR

No election is likely to be held this year. That is the latest announcement from Ottawa. Premier Bennett sees conditions improving in the country and this, he thinks, will make his return to power more likely than if he made the appeal this year.

There is no suggestion that a recent by-election may have influenced the decision but it may be taken for granted that such is the case. Also there is an election to be held in Ontario and if, as seems probable, the trend should be against Conservatism in that province, the present administration would scarcely like to face the electorate in its present humor.

Members of Parliament are generally opposed to a contest this year because some of them have only just paid their last election debts and have had no opportunity to gather a few shekels towards the next political fight.

Inspired despatches from Ottawa may be taken as correct when they say that an election is not likely, although there may be happenings which would yet cause a dissolution before the end of the year.

THE FIGHT IS ON

Premier Pattullo has been notified that he will get no money from Ottawa for his "work and wages" program. Premier Bennett is willing to help out with meeting the deficits on condition that Premier Pattullo reduces his expenditures another million dollars.

We take it that Mr. Pattullo will not further reduce his budget and that he will now take "such steps as may be necessary" to put the unemployed men to work. In other words he will have to decide which is the more important, the claims of money or humanity.

SPORT CHAT

Half a game still separated the Chicago Cubs yesterday from the New York Giants for the supremacy of the National League while the New York Yankees had a similarly slim margin over the Detroit Tigers in the American League. The National League race was tightened up Tuesday when the Cubs dropped a decision to the Pittsburgh Pirates while the Giants were winning a close free-scoring game from the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Pittsburgh Pirates, by virtue of their victory over the Chicago Cubs, advanced to third place in the National League ahead of the Boston Braves who lost a close game to the Phillies who, incidentally, advanced to seventh place, leaving the Cincinnati Reds, beaten by the Cardinals, in the cellar. The Dodgers and Cards were tied for leadership of the second division.

Cleveland Indians remained close contenders in the American League by winning a batting spree from the lowly Chicago White Sox. The Yankees and Tigers both won their games, the former over the slipping Washington Senators and the latter from the St. Louis Browns. The Boston Red Sox chalked up a victory over the Philadelphia Athletics to take fourth place in the junior circuit ahead of the Washington Senators.

REPORT ON CONVENTION

In a very searching analysis of the national characteristics of various peoples, Mr. Manniche pointed out how no one nation had all the virtues and that it was only by co-operation and by the use of each nation's contribution of its particularly national attribute that a complete education could be obtained. This would result in a far more real contribution to world peace than even the League of Nations could hope to achieve, building as it did on national differences and antipathies. The people had to be educated first.

Miss E. A. Mercer was very interesting in her report of Mr. Manniche's account of the Danish Folk High Schools and their founder. This was on an equally high level with the previous subject. The wonderful personality, the intense earnestness and the physical and intellectual ability of the founder, N. F. S. Grundboj, were all brought vividly to the listeners. The greatest contribution was probably the fact that these folk high schools educate the people into their environment, making their lives fuller, whereas so many high school systems educate the pupils away from their environment and into uncertain and at times unfriendly walks of life.

J. S. Wilson reported on various business meetings, sectional meetings and the addresses of Dean Buchanan, Dr. Weir and Professor Drummond. The debate on the resolution to affiliate with the Trades and Labor Council had been voted down. Mr. Wilson emphasized that

the deciding factor was not antipathy to the Trades and Labor people or their interests and beliefs but rather to the fact that as teachers were in charge of children from all walks and classes of life, it would be manifestly unfair to align themselves with one section, no matter how powerful or desirable. Resolutions from the local association had all been approved. Gratification was expressed that the president-elect, J. R. Mitchell, was a former resident of Prince Rupert.
