ATTRACT TOURISTS

Matter is Receiving Attention of Junior Chamber—Registered Airport to be Requested

Folders descriptive of this city furnished by City Commissioner W. J. Alder are now being distributed among passengers leaving Vancouver on northern tourist boats, it was reported at a dinner meeting of the Junior Section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce at the Knox Hotel late last week by R. L. McLennan, chairman of the tourist attraction committee. Signs are being put up at the steamship wharves directing tourists to places of interest hereabouts and existing signs of this description are being reconditioned.

The meeting heard a report from President S. J. Jabour on a recent conference in Vancouver with presidents of southern Junior Chambers of Commerce. The possibility of the formation of an Association of Junior Chambers of Commerce was discussed at this conference. A proposed province-wide tourist attraction campaign also came in for discussion.

Arrangements were made for a meeting with R. Carter Guest of Vancouver, district inspector of civil aviation, who will be here this month, to discuss the possibility of registering Prince Rupert as an airport.

A resolution was passed offering co-operation of the Junior Chamber to the Fair Board in any activity that might be attempted in the way of staging a fair after the fishing season.

CHILDREN DROWNED

Robert and "Baby" Craig of New Westminster, Aged 11 and 5, Lose Lives in Fraser

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 14: (CP)—Brother and sister, Robert and "Baby" Craig, aged 11 and 5 respectively, of Trapp Road were drowned in the North Arm of the Fraser River near here. The little girl fell off a log boom and the boy plunged in after her. Both were carried away by the current.

Prince Consort Of Holland Dies

Husband of Queen Wilhelmina Passes Away at Age of 58

THE HAGUE, Holland, July 13: (CP)—Henry, Prince Consort of Holland, husband of Queen Wilhelmina, died recently at the age of fifty-eight. He was the victim of heart disease.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

There were 204 passengers in all aboard the steamer Princess Charlotte which was in port Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Two persons disembarked from the vessel at this port while three boarded her here for Vancouver.

Having on board Misses Margaret and Edith Kergin, Dr. Fred Kergin of Toronto and Clarence Thomson of San Francisco, the power yacht Full Moon left Saturday evening for a week-end cruise in Warke Canal waters. Dr. Fred Kergin had returned to the city earlier in the evening from Premier where he had spent the week visiting with his brother and sister-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Kergin.

With a good sized list of passengers on board, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 8:30 last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

George J. Alexander of Victoria, assistant to the Commissioner of Fisheries for the province of British Columbia, was a visitor in Prince Rupert over the week-end in the course of an inspection tour of salmon canning operations along the British Columbia coast. He is visiting the Skeena and Naas Rivers as well as other areas, arriving here on the Cardena Friday night from the south and sailing for the north on the Catala late evening.

Having on board her owner, W. E. Boeing, well known Seattle aircraft manufacturer, and party of friends, the palatial yacht Taconite, which is no stranger to this port, was a week-end visitor here. The vessel arrived Saturday morning and left this morning in continuation of a coast cruise. While here she anchored in the stream off the Armour Salvage Co. floats.

Two Alaska boats, both crowded with round trip tourist passengers, were in port today. The C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arrived in port at 9 o'clock from Vancouver and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway. The C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 9:30 a.m. from Skagway and sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. The Louise had 214 passengers of whom 144 were round trippers. One person disembarked here and three went north aboard her. The George brought 187 passengers including 173 round-trippers, three of whom disembarked here.

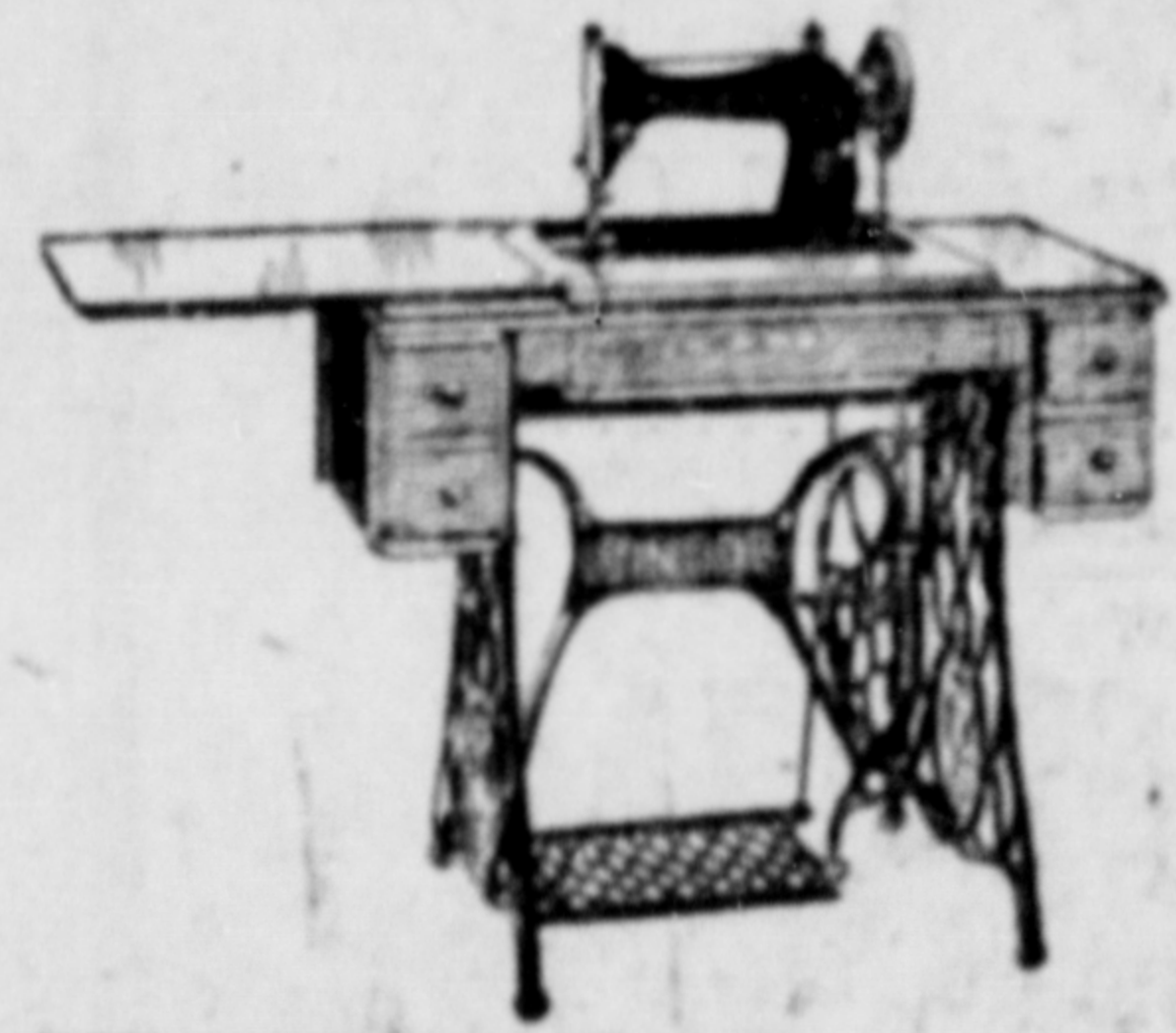
