Canada had less excuse than any other country in the world to have unemployment. It was sparsely populated and was endowed with great natural resources. There was much useful work crying to be done and the financial and banking condition of the country was most

The Premier ascribed the present condition of unemployment to the sudden cessation of large public works undertakings and the dropping of export trade to half the former proportion. After all Canada always had been and always would be dependent for its prosperity upon the development and distribution of its natural products.

Speaking of the conference proposed for this fall by Premier Bennett to discuss constitutional and other matters of inter-governmental importance, Mr. Pattullo said he saw no reason why there should be Vancouver Ball any discord or disagreement there.
