Celery Relish

ITEMS OF SPORT

Bobby McWhirter has joined the London team in the Canadian League.

Georges Hackenschmidt, accompanied by his manager, Jack Curley, and his trainer, Dr. Roller, has left England to prepare for his Labor Day match with Frank Gotch in Chicago. Hack has been training for several weeks in England.

The plot on which stands the polo grounds, the home of the New York Giants and soon to be the finest baseball plant in America, has been the property of the same family since 1783, when Silas Gardner, great-grandfather of the present owner, bought it.

What shall be done with the college athletes who compete during vacation days for the various clubs, is becoming a serious question in Amateur Athletic Union circles, and it is possible that a stringent rule may be passed at the conference in September. Many protests were lodged against the college men who competed at the national championships in Pittsburg.

The one-mile championship of the English amateur swimming association was won by H. Taylor in 23 minutes 35 1-5 seconds, a new record. The previous record in open water was 24:01 3-5.

Governor Dix has appointed the following as members of the State Athletic Commission, to supervise and regulate sparring and boxing matches, as authorized by the Frawley bill, which is now law: Bartow S. Weeks, a lawyer of New York; Major John J. Dixon, Brooklyn, a retired officer of the 47th Regiment, National Guard, and Frank O'Neill of Birmingham.

Parmer, last year's King Plate winner, has been put to jumping by his new owner Mr. Allan Chase, and promises to be a useful steeple-chaser. Oneiros, a Morpheus horse that has greatly disappointed Mr. Seagram as a Plater some years ago, afterwards brought a high price as a show jumper for Crow Murray. He is now in England and has been registered for racing under the National Hunt rules.

Hornet's Beauty, believed to be the fastest horse in England, was out of the money in the race for the Grand Prix at Ostend, Belgium. The distance was a mile and three-quarters, and Jockey Lucian Lyne who rode, said the journey was too far. He could have won at a mile and a quarter, or even a mile and a half, but the extra distance was beyond the capacity of the English champion.

New Westminster, Aug. 7.—Vancouver by winning the lacrosse match in the strenuous game on Saturday with a score of 7 to 4 put the double cross on the local aspirations to the championship. Vancouver won 7, locals 3, with only two more games to play or tie with the champions and must win next two. Vancouver displayed the best form and had things pretty much their own way during the last half. The score was: first quarter Vancouver one, Westminster one; second quarter, one each; third quarter Vancouver two, Westminster one; fourth quarter Vancouver three Westminster one.
