WILL APPOINT A COMMANDER TO THE CIVIC SNIFF YACHT

The Idea is to Relieve the Commodore from Necessity of Putting to Sea.—Civic Lords of the Admiralty Will Enforce the Sniff Yacht Schedule.

That Incense Breathing Ark of elegant contour, the Civic Sniff Yacht came again in all its elegance before the city council last night. Sanitary Inspector Macfarlane, Commodore pro tem. of the noble craft now renowned over the seven seas, and Dr. Reddie Medical Health Officer for the city, and High Admiral of the Civic Sniff Fleet, laid before the City Fathers a recommendation that a permanent commodore should be appointed to take charge of the sniff yacht in harbor and at sea thus relieving the Commodore of duty in this capacity so that he may have the more time to attend to the rustling of can and garbage cargoes for the craft.

Complaints were also dealt with by the Council that the sniff yacht had not been arriving and departing according to schedule, with the result that a portion at least of a valuable cargo consisting chiefly of empty cream cans and cabbage leaves was dumped by mistake into the sea by a teamster who took for granted the yacht had moored in accordance with schedule. It was insisted by several aldermen that the schedule should be strictly adhered to in future, and the matters mentioned are referred to the health committee. MAYOR IN ROLE OF DAVID HARUM

Will Go to Vancouver from Victoria to Buy Team of Horses for the city.

Besides his other roles Mayor Manson will act as a David Harum for the city while he is away. Today the telegraph wires chattered out a message asking him to go to Vancouver from Victoria and consult with P. Burns' men there and get their aid in purchasing a team of horses with harness for the city. The steeds must be about 1500 pounds in weight and not more than eight years old.

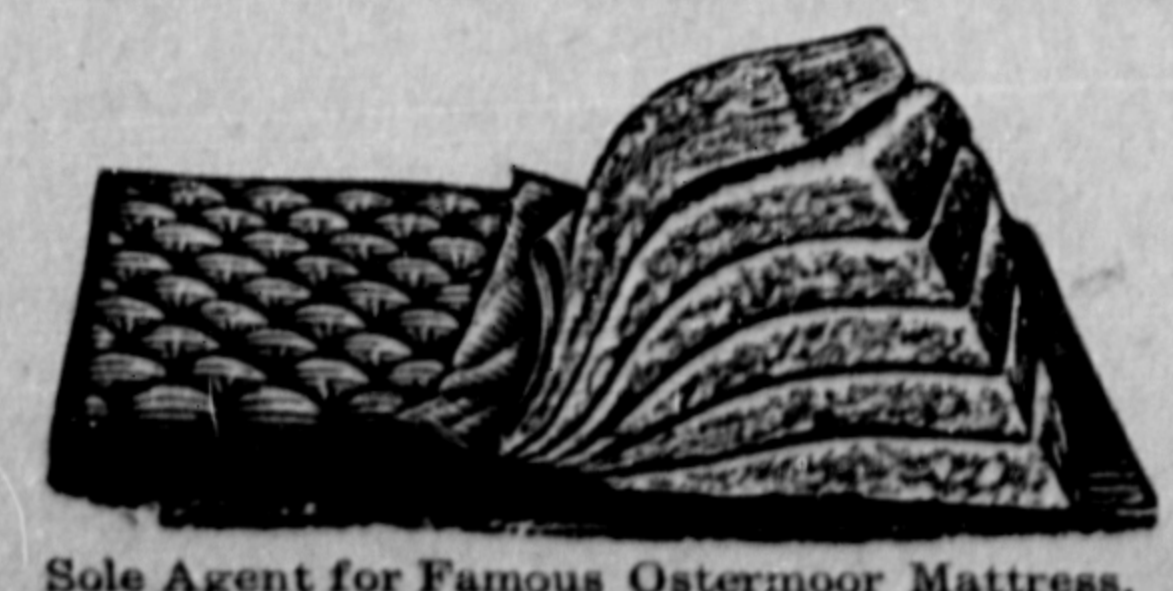

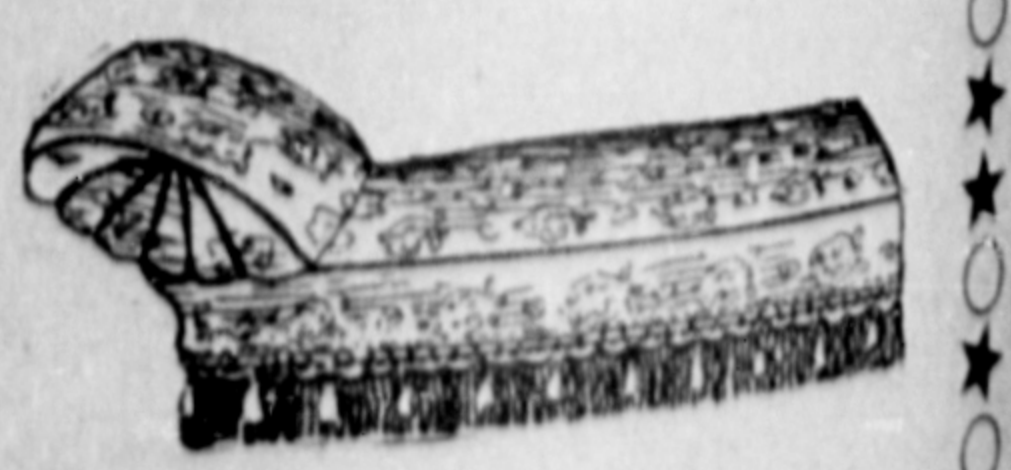
