TIGHTEN UP SALMON REGULATIONS

BRITISH HOUSE HAS ALL NIGHT SESSION ON LOTTERY BILL

Drastic Protective Measures Are To Be Imposed Next Year

Seining Season in Certain Areas to be Shortened—Gill-netting May be Delayed With Longer Close Periods—Move Out Skeena Boundaries Later

The intensity of fishing due to increased amount of gear, the rapidly increasing number of power boats used in salmon gillnetting and the increased efficiency of boats and nets generally has made it imperative that, for a reasonable conservation of the salmon supplies in District No. 2 particularly, further extensive protective measures be taken at once, according to announcement by Major J. A. Motherwell, chief supervisor of fisheries. The Department, Major Motherwell states, is determined to take whatever measures are necessary to the end that satisfactory salmon runs may be maintained even though the regulatory measures enforced any season may seem at first sight to be drastic.

PUBLICITY MAN OF ROCKEFELLER INTERESTS DIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Ivy Lebetter Lee, publicity director for the Rockefeller interests and America's most famed press agent, died here from a brain tumor at the age of fifty-seven years. He had been in hospital since October 27.

Once Millionaire, Refused Relief, So Takes Own Life

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—A man, who claimed that he used to be a millionaire but was now penniless, applied for relief here and, upon being refused, took his own life.

UNHURT BY DEPRESSION

Chain Stores Increase Profits Despite Hard Times, Commission is Told

OTTAWA, Nov. 13: (CP)—Canadian chain stores suffered relatively little damage during the depression, the mass buying commission was told yesterday by F. P. Higgins, Toronto auditor.

Higgins showed that six of the large chain store organizations increased gross profits, net profits and dividend paid in 1933 as compared with 1929 despite a slight decrease in net sales.

This was in contrast with acute losses suffered by manufacturers, farmers and other classes.

THE FIVE AND TEN

Since 1929 F. W. Woolworth Co. Ltd. has transferred to the parent company in New York \$11,200,000, the commission was told today by one of its auditors. This represented net profits and dividends after income taxes had been paid.

The commission was informed that the Canadian Woolworth organization is owned and controlled by New York head office and the Canadian company is assessed for a portion of the executive salaries paid in New York. During the past five years the Canadian company paid \$2,750,000 to cover New York management salaries while the Canadian officials were only paid \$1,500,000, leaving an overcharge of \$1,250,000.

Hon. H. H. Stevens, former chairman of the commission, said this was a "winning" and equivalent to a dividend. He suggested that the Department of National Revenue investigate.

BYLAW CASES BEING HEARD

Something in Nature of Test Being Made in Connection With Nightsoil Actions

Taking the form somewhat of test cases, police court proceedings were opened this afternoon before Magistrate McClymont with James Hillman, A. Gomez and James Black as defendants on charges of failing to pay rates levied under the city's nightsoil bylaw. They may constitute the prelude to many other similar prosecutions. City Solicitor E. F. Jones is prosecuting.

Lone Bandit Gets \$900 From Bank In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13.—A lone bandit held up C. O. Odell, the manager of a suburban bank at Sunset and Echo Streets, and escaped with \$900, making his getaway in a passing automobile which he commandeered on the street outside the bank.

Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The British pound sterling closed at \$5.01 on the local foreign exchange market yesterday and the Canadian dollar at a premium of 2¾c.

FORTY MILLION DOLLARS NEEDED BY NEW YORK TO MEET WORKLESS RELIEF

NEW YORK, Nov. 13:—Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia today placed before the board of aldermen of New York an estimate of \$40,000 to take care of unemployment relief in the city during the coming year. Taxation measures to provide for the raising of this amount will be immediately considered. The sum of \$1,000,000 has been advanced by the city's banks but it will only last for a week.

Chicago Churches Are Annoyed With Veterans' Plans

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—The Chicago Federation of Churches has mildly reproved ex-service men's organizations for arranging a parade and Armistice ceremonies to take place at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. The special demonstration was responsible, the churches claim, for almost emptying them of their congregations. Ten thousand men took part in the parade. The church organization suggests that, the next time an Armistice Day falls on Sunday, it be celebrated at a different hour than church time.

STOCK MARKET STAYS STRONG

Boom Continues in New York Following Endorsement of New Deal Last Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The New York stock market, which has been advancing steadily since the congressional elections last week, continues strong in a revival of buying activity with a number of manufacturing and industrial issues touching new highs for the year. The bond market, however, continues irregular.

Volume of trading is heavy, with 687,000 shares changing hands in Saturday's short session. The industrial average closed at the week-end at 99.21, up .19, the average being the highest since July 14. A number of issues advancing as much as three points. The rail average was 36.34, up .01, and utilities, 19.70, off .06. The bond average was 93.68, up .12.

The market was closed yesterday in observance of Armistice Day.

RECOGNIZE MANCHUKUO

Reported That Great Britain Intends To Do So—Big Loan Being Floated

LONDON, November 13.—Official recognition of the Japanese state of Manchukuo by the British government appears to be imminent. With the exception of Japan, San Salvador is the only nation that so far has officially recognized Manchukuo by having relations with it.

It is reported persistently here that a London banking syndicate intends to grant a large loan to Manchukuo.

TAX SALE CANCELLED

Vancouver City Drawing Up New Scheme For Payment of Tax Areas

VANCOUVER, November 13.—(Canadian Press)—The Vancouver city annual tax sale, scheduled to open today, has been cancelled and the civic administration is preparing a six-year tax consolidation scheme to cover arrears in taxes from 1931. More than a thousand homes and 3,500 parcels of vacant land were listed in the sale.

Under the new arrangement the taxpayer will be forced to pay arrears annually with interest at five percent and the principal will be paid in six yearly instalments in fixed proportions. There will also be credit with rebate on current taxes.

Canadians Take Honors at New York Horse Show

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—It is expected that Canada will carry off the honors at the National Horse Show now in progress at Madison Square Garden here. The event is proving a great success and is attracting thousands of visitors. Royal Canadian Mounted Police from Canada under Superintendent J. M. Tugger of Regina, formerly of Prince Rupert, are declared to be stealing the show every night.

KING FUAD IS SERIOUS

Egyptian Monarch in Critical Condition Last Night But Still Alive

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, November 13.—King Fuad of Egypt, although having taken another critical turn in his illness, was reported last night to be still alive. German specialists have been called in to attend the King.

UNITED STATES SENDS PROTEST

Washington Takes Exception Officially To Treatment Accorded American Fliers in Persia

WASHINGTON D. C., November 13.—The State Department has sent a note to the Persian government protesting at the treatment accorded Jack Wright and John Poland, United States competitors in the recent England to Melbourne air race, when they were forced down there in the course of the flight.

WINNIPEG BREAD WAR

WINNIPEG, November 13 (Canadian Press)—With a warning that the Manitoba Minimum Wage Act would be strictly enforced, Premier John Bracken of Manitoba yesterday told independent bakers to see if they could not patch up the bread war here that has been giving housewives two loaves of bread for five cents.

Winston Churchill Is Obstructionist Leader In Commons Debate

Sixteen Clauses of Voluminous Measure Are Piloted Through With Resort to Closure on Several Occasions by Home Secretary

LONDON, Nov. 13: (CP)—The House of Commons rose at 5 o'clock this morning after a session of more than fourteen hours in which sixteen clauses of the voluminous Lotteries Bill were piloted through the report stage. Obstruction of the bill was led by the fiery Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill and, at times, Sir John Gilmour, Home Secretary, was forced to resort to the closure to offset obstructionist tactics.

DIES AT CENOTAPH

Dramatic Death on Remembrance Day of Capt. William Stuart of Ottawa, Aged Veteran

OTTAWA, Nov. 13: (CP)—Capt. William Stuart, eighty-year old Great War veteran, died of a heart attack on Sunday while placing a wreath on the cenotaph here on Remembrance Day.

The late Capt. Stuart was in the contracting business and operated from Halifax to the Yukon. He was a famous lacrosse player in the early days.

Divorce Refused Herbert Marshall

Edna Best, His Wife, Will Only Agree to Legal Separation—Gloria Swanson Third Party

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 13.—It is learned here that Edna Best, wife of Herbert Marshall, well known British actor, whose name has been prominently mentioned in connection with Gloria Swanson, who secured a divorce last week from her fourth husband, Michael Farmer, has refused to give Marshall a divorce and will agree only to a legal separation.

General Director Of Metropolitan Opera Has Quit

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Giulio Gatti-Casazza, general director of the Metropolitan Opera Company for twenty-six years, has resigned. No successor has yet been appointed although many names prominent in the musical world are heard.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13.—U. C. L. A. defeated St. Mary's by a score of 6 to nil yesterday in one of the major football upsets of the season.

Ellen McAdoo And Manila Husband On Honeymoon Trip

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Mr. and Mrs. Rafael Lopez de Onate, who were married on Saturday at Albuquerque, New Mexico, arrived here yesterday in the course of their honeymoon trip. The bride, nineteen years of age, is the former Ellen McAdoo, daughter of Senator William Gibbs McAdoo of California and granddaughter of the late former President Woodrow Wilson. The groom comes from Manila but denies that he has Filipino blood.

'Lady For a Day' Is Asphyxiated

Helen McCarthy and Her Husband Identified in New York Morgue

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Having been asphyxiated by escaping gas in a tiny tenement flat over a week ago, Helen McCarthy ("Apple Annie"), woman apple vendor, who was the inspiration of the Damon Runyon story and talking picture "Lady For a Day," and her elderly husband were identified in a local morgue at the week-end.

W. C. T. U. Protests At Light Wines On White House Table

PHILADELPHIA, November 13.—The Women's Christian Temperance Union of Philadelphia has passed a resolution protesting at Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's announcement that she will permit the serving of light wines at the dinner table in the White House.

PREMATURE EXPLOSION KILLS SEVEN MEN AT ISLAND OF CATALINA
