P. T. ASS'N RESUMES

"How to Study" Subject of Interesting Address by Frank Charnley

The first regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers Association since the summer vacation was held last night in the Borden Street School with Mrs. D. C. Stuart presiding.

Following the business meeting and musical program, F. Charnley, member of the scientific staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, gave an address of great interest to parents and teachers on the subject "How to Study." At the outset Mr. Charnley briefly considered the human body as a behaving organism and described, by means of diagrams and examples, the receiving, connecting, and reacting mechanisms. Study and learning were intimately related to the laws and principles of psychology. The first great principle was that all learning was reacting. Mr. Charnley next defined and elaborated the most important of the laws of learning. These were: The Law of Use, The Law of Disuse, The Law of Effect, and the Law of Association. Tracing the learning process from the simpler forms of sensory-motor learning up to the higher and more complex thought and reasoning processes, the speaker showed how these great laws were involved in all learning processes. Interesting examples were given of how these laws were specifically applied to the teaching and learning of such subjects as writing, spelling, memorizing and problem solving. The importance of the principle of intelligent use was emphasized in the learning of spelling and in the acquisition of the vocabulary of a foreign language.

Certain economical methods of study which resulted in greater permanence of recall, and, consequently, in the improvement of learning were explained and elaborated. Such methods were: learning by wholes or by large units in preference to part learning or learning by small units; spaced practice periods in preference to unspaced periods; part of the study period given to recall by recitation in preference to devoting the whole time to reading.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 20: (CP)—Capt. Jud Thurber of Prince Rupert arrived from the Area No. 3 banks yesterday with his halibut boat Vera Beatrice, bringing in the first catch of halibut to be received here in many weeks.

Capt. Thurber sold 3000 pounds of chickens and large at 8c and 3500 pounds of medium at 8.6c as well as 5,000 pounds of black cod at 5c.

PACK FOR THIS YEAR

Total of 1,660,000 Cases of Salmon Has so Far Been Put up, Official Figures Show

VANCOUVER, Sept. 20: (CP)—The British Columbia salmon pack on September 15 totalled 1,060,000 cases or nearly 700,000 cases less than in 1930.

The Fraser River pack totalled 217,000 cases, approximately 55,000 cases higher than in 1930.

EDUCATION DISCUSSED

Roth Gordon M.A. of High School Staff is Speaker Before Rotary Club Today

Stressing the desirability of equal educational opportunity for all regardless of the classification or size of community, Roth Gordon of the teaching staff of King Edward High School was an interesting speaker before the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in the Commodore Cafe today, his subject being "Secondary Education in Small Communities." Mr. Gordon summarized for the benefit of his listeners a thesis on the basis of which he had obtained his Master of Arts degree, describing conditions in British Columbia. Results of a questionnaire which had been sent to school boards and principals were disclosed and statistics obtained from year books and other sources were referred to.

After describing educational conditions as they exist today, Mr. Gordon offered suggestions for reorganization and improvements.

The speaker distinguished between urban and rural schools, dividing communities for the purpose of his discourse into three classes—rural, communities with high schools of from one to four rooms; semi-rural, with from five to ten rooms, and urban, with over ten rooms of which there were only three in British Columbia—Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster.

J. J. Little, president of the club, was in the chair and thanked Mr. Gordon at the end of his address.
