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# DANAE SAILORS DOPED AND ROBBED

## MARVIN NELSON WINS SWIM MARATHON FOR THIRD TIME

### Sailors From British Warship Are Roughed By Vancouver Bandits

One Seaman in Hospital in Critical Condition—Police Have Suspect in Custody in Connection With Incident

VANCOUVER, Sept. 1: (CP)—Vancouver police are holding one man today in connection with the drugging and robbing of two sailors from H. M. S. Danae which is paying a visit to this port in the course of a Pacific Coast cruise. Able Seaman P. Davis is in a serious condition in hospital as a result of the incident while Able Seaman G. Jackson has been able to return to the ship after receiving hospital treatment.

### EIGHTEEN ARE DEAD

Trace Yet of Three Americans Kidnapped by Bandits Who Wrecked Train

HARBIN, Manchuria, Sept. 1:—Latest reports on the wrecking of the train on the South Manchurian Railway on Friday by Chinese bandits state that eighteen Japanese were killed while about one hundred were injured. There is no trace of three Americans, employees of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Co. who are missing and believed kidnapped. There are said to have been atrocities such as the cutting off of limbs. Many valuables are also believed to have been taken.

### Giant Meteor In Spectacular Fall

### REDS IN WALK-OUT

Red Menace in Connection With Textile Workers' Strike Called For Tonight in U.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 1: (CP)—Threats of Communist strike have entered into the impending cotton textile strike while Union leaders are fighting to hold their lines on American principles.

The strike order issued yesterday called for a walk-out of some 500,000 spinners and weavers over a territory of 1,281 miles in New England and the south tonight following collapse of peace negotiations here.

The strike was extended today to include 200,000 silk workers, completely paralyzing the textile industry with approximately 700,000 workers involved.

The strike becomes effective at midnight tonight.

### JAILED FOR EXTORTION

Ed. Chard Gets Eighteen Months In Prison For Attempting to Get Money From H. Labatt

TORONTO, Sept. 1:—Ed. Chard was sentenced to eighteen months at the Ontario reformatory yesterday after he had pleaded guilty to a charge of attempted extortion of \$5000 from Hugh Labatt, brother of John S. Labatt, recently kidnapped London brewer.

#### Hopped Off Today For Telegraph Creek

### Fort Dodge Man Again Water Sprint Champ In Race At Toronto

Covered Fifteen Miles in Seven Hours and Forty-Six Minutes—Bill Goll Second and Johnny Caird Third

TORONTO, Sept. 1: (CP)—Marvin Nelson of Fort Dodge, Iowa, twice already winner of the fifteen mile marathon swim for men at the Canadian National Fair here, hung up his third victory yesterday when he outlasted a starting field of ninety to win the first prize of \$5000 and the world's championship. His time was seven hours and forty-six minutes.

### British Pound Is Down Below \$5 in Gotham

NEW YORK, Sept. 1:—For the first time since the United States dollar became effectively stabilized last February at its new gold value, the British pound sterling yesterday sold below \$5, dropping to \$4.99½. The Canadian dollar was quoted at \$1.02¼ on the local foreign exchange market.

Government Auditor Finds That Temiskaming & Northern Ontario Railway Has Run Behind \$9,000,000

NORTH BAY, Ont., Sept. 1:—Harry W. Steele of Ottawa, government investigating auditor on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railroad, in making his concluding report, declares that the deficit has been found to amount to \$9,018,211 or \$1,403,952 more than set up in the annual statement.

### PRINCE ON DEPRESSION

Crisis is More One of Confidence Than of Purses, Declares His Royal Highness

BIARRITZ, France, Sept. 1:—The Prince of Wales is reported to have commented in conversation with the mayor of this city as follows:

"The crisis and difficult situation from which all countries are suffering is a moral crisis of confidence rather than a crisis of purses and such a crisis necessarily stimulates progress."
