## SINCLAIR TO BE IN FIELD IS CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT

**Epic Candidate For Governor Of California Refuses To Drop Out of Fight**

SANTA CLARA, Cal., Oct. 26.—It was announced yesterday following a conference between Upton Sinclair, Democratic nominee for governor of California, and Raymond Haight, the Progressive Commonwealth candidate, that both would be remaining in the field as candidates for the chief executiveship of the state. Sinclair refused to concede to overtures on behalf of Haight that he (Sinclair) should withdraw.

There will thus be a split opposition to Governor Merriam, the Republican nominee for re-election, but Sinclair still remains the popular favorite to win.

## TRAIN WAS VERY FAST

**Three Thousand Miles Covered in Fifty-Seven Hours—Reached 120 M.P.H. Speed**

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (CP)—The Union Pacific stream-lined h.p. train, powered by a 900 h.p. diesel engine, on its arrival here yesterday morning from Los Angeles, had covered three thousand miles across the continent in fifty-six hours and fifty-six minutes. At one time between Chicago and New York it maintained a world's speed record of 120 miles per hour.

William A. Harriman, president of the Union Pacific Railway, announced yesterday that his company planned to inaugurate a weekly streamline train service between Los Angeles and New York early next year. If it proved popular, a daily service would be established.
