THOUSANDTH COAST TRIP

Popular Coast Liner Prince George Will be on This Voyage Next Week—Colorful Career

Next week the Canadian National Steamships coast liner Prince George will be making her one thousandth run in the British Columbia coast service. Of the four skippers who have commanded her during her many years of service in coastal waters, three are still living. Captain George Robertson, her first skipper, is now director of pilotage for the federal government at Ottawa. Capt. F. T. Saunders, who succeeded Capt. Robertson, is now superintendent of pilots for British Columbia and is located in Vancouver. Capt. W. S. Morehouse, third to command the George, is now dead. He also joined the pilot service on leaving the Canadian National service. Capt. H. E. Nedden, her fourth and present commander, is a past-president of the Canadian Merchant Service Guild and still a director of that organization. In her lifetime on the Pacific Coast, the Prince George has had a colorful career, witnessing the growth of a tremendous tourist trade to Alaska and the upbuilding of many communities on Canada's West Coast. The Prince George also saw service during the Great War. She was commissioned as a hospital ship and found herself decked out in a new suit of white with a red cross adorning her middle funnel. Built by Swan, Hunter and Richardson and engine by Walsend Engineering Company at Newcastle-on-Tyne, the Prince George was a model of perfection when she first reached the coast and subsequent improvements have kept her still one of the finest vessels in the northern run.

Mother of Charles Balagno Succumbs

Late Mrs. Salvina Balagno of Victoria Had Resided Forty Years On Vancouver Island

Mrs. Salvina Balagno, wife of Joseph Balagno of Victoria and mother of Charles P. Balagno, passed away suddenly in the south yesterday after a lengthy illness, news of her demise having been received here by wire yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Balagno sailed on the Princess Adelaide last night for Victoria to attend the funeral which will take place on Monday and, on her return to the city in two weeks' time, will be accompanied by her daughter, Miss Marie Balagno, who will spend the Christmas and New Year season at her home here. The late Mrs. Balagno, who was sixty-six years of age, was born in Italy but had spent forty years or more on Vancouver Island. Previously she resided at Wellington and later at Ladysmith but for upwards of twenty years had made her home in Victoria. Besides her widower, who is a well known Victoria importer, she is survived by four sons, Charles Balagno, Prince Rupert; Frank and Peter in Victoria, and William in Seattle, and one daughter, Mrs. Josephine Laur-endi of Victoria. The local relatives will have the sincere sympathy of many local friends in their bereavement.

Doing Time For Deer Slaughter


Harold Simonsen and Aksel Osand Cases Dealt With in Provincial Police Court
