ONTARIO AND SASKATCHEWAN ELECTORS VOTE TODAY

Eastern Province Has Fine Weather For Its Poll; Storm on Prairie

Make Survey Of Internal Debts

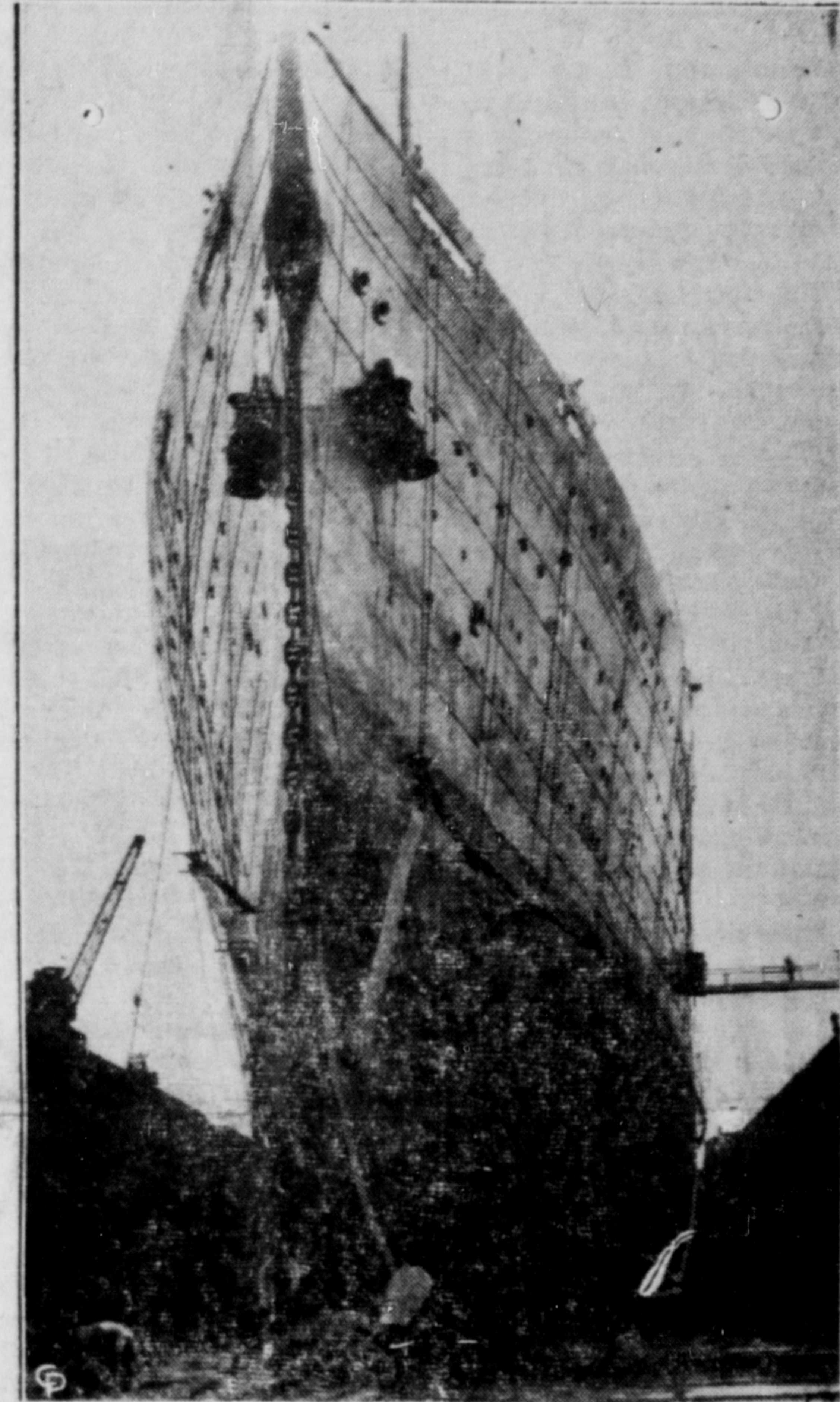
Whole Structure To Be Studied With View To Making Revisions

Forty Million Dollars to Be Expended on Public Works By Dominion Gov't., Announced

The projects mentioned in the bill are apportioned among the provinces on a general basis of population. They will be the subject of tenders for all expenditures of more than \$25,000 unless the work is urgent.

American Solons Rise To Conclude Eventful Washington Session

Alaska Shipping Is Still Moving

Big Liner Aleutian Arrives at Ketchikan From Seattle Monday Night

KETCHIKAN, June 19:—Ships continue to move between Seattle and Alaska, the exemption of Alaska shipping from the longshoremen's strike being still in operation.

The big Alaska Steamship Co.'s liner Aleutian arrived at 9 o'clock last night from Seattle with passengers and freight. The steamer Alaska is due in port on Thursday southbound.

The accumulation of freight at Seattle for Alaska is now being cleaned up nicely, practically all crews and freight for the fishing industry being now in the territory.

STRIKE BOARD IN STATES PLANNED

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 19:—It is reported in authoritative quarters here that President Roosevelt may be granted power to set up a labor board which would have the authority to settle labor disputes and end long drawn out strikes.

BOATS TO BE LOADED

Mayors of San Francisco, Tacoma, Seattle and Portland Taking Steps to Break Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19:—Mayors of San Francisco, Seattle, Tacoma, Portland and other Pacific Coast ports will attempt to break the longshoremen's strike by ordering ships loaded under police guard. That this will lead to further waterfront disorders is believed to be certain.

Mayors of these cities have expressed their determination that ships must be loaded and the ports allowed to function despite the almost one hundred percent vote of union longshoremen at these ports against accepting a compromise agreement for the settlement of the strike.

STRIKE IS STILL ON

N. R. A. Official at Ketchikan Looks For Early Settlement of Trolling Tie-up

KETCHIKAN, June 19:—The salmon fishermen's strike situation was unchanged here yesterday although Mr. Morgan, National Recovery Act official who is at present here, stated that, from reports he had received, he looked for a settlement within ten days. Meantime both the fishermen and buyers appeared to be standing pat.
