RECIPROCITY IS AGAIN BEING

CONSER TIVES ABOUT TO START ELECTION CAMPAIGN

Commerce Chambers of United States Seeking Canadian Trade Pacts

Secretary of State Cordell Hull Asked to Open Negotiations With This Dominion at Earliest Possible Date

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 27: (CP)-Secretary of State Cordell Hull was urged today by Henry I. Harriman, president of the Chambers of Commerce of the United States, to open reciproval tariff negotiations with Canada at the earliest possible date. Mr. Harriman declared that a joint committee comprising members of the Canadian and American chambers had recommended such a course. Mr. Hull replied that the matter would likely be considered at an early date.
