We have heard the subject often discussed. We have heard local people deplore the fact that so much business goes to the mail order houses. We have heard wail after wail in regard to the disloyalty of the people to the city. Now comes a visitor who says he never knew a city in which the people were so loyal as in Prince Rupert. He finds that very many people consider what effect their actions will have on the city rather than on themselves. He looks upon this as a place where Prince Rupert is their god, the most loyal community he has visited.

So there you are. It seems to be largely a matter of opinion or perhaps a matter of comparison. We may be disloyal but our disloyalty is so much less than other places that it really is loyalty.

THE BIRD THAT FOULS ITS OWN NEST

There were men and women who came here, earned good salaries here, were treated like kings and queens and then went away and said what a terrible place it was. This was years ago. The bird that fouls its own nest cannot expect to lead a happy life and neither can the person who is willing to live in a city and make a home there, even if only temporarily, expect to live happily if always speaking ill of his home town. While Prince Rupert has its disadvantages it also has its advantages and the latter greatly overbalance the former.

CLEVELAND IS LEADING

Indians Continue Winning Streak To Displace Yankees at Top Of American League

CLEVELAND, May 28: (CP)—Cleveland Indians, continuing their victorious home stand by defeating the Philadelphia Athletics both yesterday and Saturday, took over the leadership of the American League with a mathematic margin over the New York Yankees who suffered defeat at the hands of the St. Louis Browns in a heavy-hitting game yesterday after having won on Saturday.

The three-way tie for third place was broken with the Detroit Tigers taking over the position exclusively by winning over the Boston Red Sox both Saturday and Sunday. The Washington Senators defeated the Chicago White Sox both Saturday and Sunday to stay in fourth place, leaving the St. Louis Browns at the top of the second division.

There were no changes in National League standings as a result of week-end play, the Pittsburgh Pirates remaining on top with a half game margin over the St. Louis Cardinals.

New York Yankees lost again on Friday to the Chicago White Sox as a result of which their lead was cut to but a single game over the Cleveland Indians who won in a slugging bee over the Boston Red Sox at Cleveland. The St. Louis Browns, losing to the Washington Senators at St. Louis, and the Detroit Tigers, suffering defeat at the hands of the Philadelphia Athletics, dropped into a three-way tie for third place with the Senators. The Red Sox and Athletics, as a result of Friday's play, were left in a tie for sixth place.

Both St. Louis teams improved their positions in the Big League baseball standings as a result of victories Thursday. In the American League, the Browns triumphed again at home over the slipping Washington Senators and were then in third place in standing with a mathematical lead over the Detroit Tigers who defeated the Philadelphia Athletics Thursday after losing on Wednesday. In the National League the Cardinals de-

feated the Dodgers at Brooklyn and stepped into second place in the standing ahead of the Chicago Cubs who were losing again to the Giants at the Polo Grounds to slump into a poor third place with but a half game margin over the Giants.


