Fears Held For Safety Of Stricken Japanese Vessel;

Captain and Mates Perish

NEW YORK, Dec. 10: (CP)-With her bridge and rudder washed away by mountainous seas, the captain and chief officer dead, the third officer missing and believed swept overboard and at least seven of her crew injured, the Japanese freighter Victoria Maru, bound from Hamburg for New York, was reported disabled and sinking today 400 miles north of the Azores.

The vessel broke down when caught in a terrific gale and fears were entertained that she might not be able to live until the arrival of assistance.

The American liner Washington and numerous other ships were reported to have turned from their courses to rush to the aid of the stricken vessel wal-

lowing in the seas with crew of thirty-six on board. Last reports, despite urgent "S.O.S." calls, were that the vessel was being directed by her propeller and was, apparently, holding her own.
