"The award of titles is not going to help Canada to alleviate the tension which already exists between those who have and those who have not. Emphatically now is not the time to raise class distinctions. Anyone who during the last four years has tried to read the signs of the times knows what a revolution in ideas has been going on. It was only the realization by those who were down and out that most people were honestly trying to do their share in alleviating conditions that stilled the hostility to things as they are and prevented a more aggressive demand that they be righted.

"It would, therefore, seem to be very stupid to revive once more an archaic system of class distinction which we can do without in Canada, which will only tend to create a system of castes and stir up class antagonisms that we cannot afford in this virile young country.


