MAKING PRINCE RUPERT "EXPORT CONSCIOUS"

A well known Vancouver shipping man, who visited the city last week in connection with the movement of interior aspen logs through this port to the Orient, remarked that he found local people lacked "export consciousness"—that they did not seem to realize the possibilities of the use of the port in overseas shipping and, indeed, some had apparently, almost accepted the impossibility of such business here. The same visitor declared that he could see very definite possibilities along this line here and that it would be easy to route considerable volume of inborne cargo here providing outward part cargoes could be arranged. He mentioned in this connection timbers of various varieties and cheaper grades of grain. In addition to this, we know that various forms of fishery products could also be used in making up of part cargoes.

According to the visitor, the two outstanding obstacles to shipping of this sort from Prince Rupert at this time are the fact that the facilities for handling the cargo have either become antiquated or been allowed to fall into disrepair for lack of use and that much of the suitable timber which abounds here cannot be exported owing to the regulation which requires that only timber or logs from crown-granted limits can be shipped out of the country.

As far as the port facilities are concerned, doubtless, now that the business is here and ready to be handled, the railway company will automatically see that its equipment is put in shape. This should be done, we would imagine, without even the Chamber of Commerce having to suggest it.

As for the raising of the embargo on export of timber, that may be a little more difficult although there would appear to be no good reason why the necessary action on the part of the government should be refused if it is going to benefit us. Possibly, it was timely that the Premier himself—our member—should have been here at the time the matter was brought up. Mr. Pattullo knows the situation with regard to the timber industry here without any recital having to be made to him in regard to it and we are of the opinion that, through his instrumentality, any difficulties which may exist in connection with the matter can be quite readily removed.

NEWPORT, R.I., Sept. 17: (CP)—Although less than a mile from the finish line when the time limit of five and a half hours for the America's Cup yacht race was reached on Saturday, it being called "no contest" because neither the Rainbow, the American defender, or the Endeavour, British challenger, had been able to finish within the time, Harold S. Vanderbilt, owner and skipper of the Rainbow, made no attempt to finish the distance. The American boat was half a mile ahead when the race was called off.

Among those who viewed the race was President Franklin D. Roosevelt from aboard the Vanderbilt yacht.

The classic was resumed today with odds swinging in favor of the Rainbow owing to her performance on Saturday.

tunnel proves satisfactory a mill will be installed in order to separate the gold from the blismuth and it is expected a market will be found for the latter. The mill will be erected at the mine with bunkers at the station two miles below. Already two lakefront acre lots have been sold in anticipation of development at Lake Kathlyn from which point the coal and concentrates will be shipped.

A 2,200-foot tunnel has been started at the top of Hudson Bay Mountain on the Silver Lake property under option from the McGill estate. Eight men and a coolie are employed there. This is a silver property but Mr. Wilson expects the metal will be worth a dollar an ounce possibly by the time he is ready to ship next year. Some of the ore in this mine goes \$300 to the ton and it is planned to "go right after it" as soon as the price is high enough.

In connection with his mining ventures in the district, Mr. Wilson says he has no stock for sale. He expects all his properties to be active producers.
