Mass Buying Commission Hears Further Sensational Evidence Of Practices in Chain Stores

OTTAWA, Dec. 1: (CP)-The price spreads and mass buying commission yesterday heard an inside story of "gypping the public." It heard how, under the chain store system whereby branch managers were held responsible for the stock, these managers and employees had to resort to short weight and other questionable practices in order to protect themselves.

Two former employees of the Thrift Stores Limited in Montreal and one from Dominion Stores, Toronto, told of how package goods were weighed out at fifteen ounces instead of a full pound, how unwary customers were short changed, how women with large shopping bags of goods were overcharged small amounts, how vinegar was diluted with water, how water was mixed with cream and sold for table cream and how five or ten pounds of salt was added to hundredweights of sugar.

The employees said they were forced into illegal actions or they would have lost their jobs.

Forty Percent of Cost Of Unemployed Care Is Put On Municipality

Means Added Financial Burden of Which Prince Rupert Had Been Free For Fifteen Months, Having Had Only Responsibility of Administration

Throwing back upon the city a considerable financial burden of which it had been free for over a year, word was received at the City Hall today that the city will be required hereafter to pay forty percent of relief costs, the government paying the other sixty percent. The city had formerly paid thirty-three and one-third percent of relief but, during the past fifteen months, the government has borne the entire cost, the city merely administering relief.
