PRISON OUTBREAK NINE KILLED IN

BLOODY WARFARE CONTINUES IN VIENNA DURING NIGHT

Socialists Appeared To Have Upper Hand; Authorities Sieged

500 to 2,000 Estimated Dead Following Sanguine Conflict in Capital and Other Important Cities of Austria

Women and Children Suffer

Terrible Carnage in Capital City of Austria Especially in Working Class District at Karl Marx Apartment

VIENNA, Feb. 13:—An unofficial estimate tonight placed the number of dead at 500 in the civil war while rumors with some basis of plausibility placed the toll as high as 2,000. A large majority of the deaths were in the Vienna working class district.

It is feared that many women and children were killed when artillery shelled the Karl Marx apartment.

VIENNA, Feb. 13:—With the death list estimated to be running over the 200 mark-at east one hundred being in Vienna—and hundreds suffering injuries, many probably fatal, bloody warfare continued in the streets of Vienna and other cities of Austria throughout the night.
