## EMPIRE WAS HIS SUBJECT

Captain J. S. Wilson Gives Interesting Address to Rotary Club At Its Luncheon

## Name Now in Firm The Markets

"Our Empire—Her Peace, Power and Beauty" was the subject of an interesting address on Wednesday afternoon at the Rotary Club luncheon in which Captain J. S. Wilson spoke of the contribution of the Empire to world peace and progress. He showed how the idea of the Empire was changing and expressed preference for "Commonwealth of Nations" rather than "Empire," and suggested that this would be the basis for a future "Commonwealth of the World."

Mr. Wilson transposed his title to read "The Beauty of Her Power is Peace." He mentioned the fact that the Empire embraces people of all religions, races and colors, tolerating and even encouraging them. The apparently haphazard way in which the Empire had been formed was mentioned. It was largely a matter of chance that Canada formed part of it. Australia also came in by chance and South Africa was little different. The speaker then told of the ridiculous situation in which men who went to war were placed. On either side men tried to kill each other who were equally valuable to the world and had no personal grudge against each other. If they realized this at the time they would hesitate about shooting. Lack of knowledge was usually at the bottom of these conflicts.

**Liberty Is Keynote**  
The great common idea in the British Empire was that of liberty. History showed how dearly won had been the liberty the Empire enjoyed. It had been secured as the result of great sacrifices. The Empire owed much to the Royal Family, whose understanding of conditions was perhaps the greatest single factor in holding the parts of the Empire together. The King was the symbol of Imperial unity. The army, air force and navy were the insurance system. In modern times Britain had showed the way in helping to formulate peace policies. The League of Nations was a valiant attempt to bring about permanent peace, but it was wrong in principle. It tried to superimpose something on the world instead of beginning at the bottom and training the children. The rising tide of nationalism was a danger. In concluding Mr. Wilson spoke of the object lesson in unification of people of various nationalities. It was ours to leave a heritage to the next generation which would bring about improved conditions. No nation had a monopoly of all the attributes. We should take the best from the different nations in the work of bringing about a commonwealth of the world.
