

WORST STRIKE RIOTING IN ENGLAND'S HISTORY

Police, Military, and Railway Employees Fought with Fixed Bayonets on the Streets of Liverpool—Bars Looted and Houses Fired—Many Killed and Injured.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Liverpool, Aug. 15.—Today saw one of the worst clashes between a mob of strikers and the police that has ever happened in the history of England. One policeman was killed, many were injured, and scores of rioters suffered death or serious injury. Skulls were fractured by missiles recklessly hurled, and the police driven to desperate straits by the frantic attacks of the mob used clubs heavily doing serious execution amongst the rioters.

Fired Houses

Two houses were fired, many bar rooms were wrecked and looted, and the strikers inflamed with stolen liquor even when confronted and charged by a hastily organized body of troops with fixed bayonets, repeatedly reformed and renewed the rioting. Again and again the soldiers had to charge, and the wounds inflicted with bayonets and the butt-ends of rifles will in many cases it is feared, prove fatal. Hundreds of broken heads are being treated at the hospitals, and numerous cases of fractured

skulls are critical. The exact list of those killed and injured cannot yet be obtained. The mob took advantage of the relaxation of police control after the officers had been on day and night duty for an extended spell, and the looting of bar rooms led to the heavy list of casualties.

Trouble Extending

London, Eng., Aug. 15.—There is now a danger of the whole transportation system of England and Scotland's being tied up by the strike of railway employees. The authorities all over the British Isles are preparing to face the complete paralysis of business all over the United Kingdom. Extensions of the strike are threatened from all commercial centres now that the effect of the strikers' success in London has encouraged disaffected employees in other parts. Besides the outbursts in Liverpool acute strike difficulty is expected now from Sheffield, Bristol, Manchester and Glasgow. The men in these centres are all threatening to go out, and are holding frequent meetings.
