

INTERESTS OF PEACE

Woodsworth Would Ban Export of Nickel as Being Useful in Preparing For War

OTTAWA, March 23: (CP)—J. S. Woodsworth, C. C. F. member for Winnipeg North Centre, urged in the House of Commons that export of nickel from Canada be prohibited on the grounds that the metal was being used by foreign countries in the manufacture of armaments looking to future warfare.

The proposal did not receive a very warm reception from the government side of the House.

TOLD ABOUT EARLY DAYS

Major M. A. Burbank Interesting Speaker on Railroad at Gyo Luncheon Yesterday

A diverting and entertaining informal talk on railroading in the old boom days not so long after the beginning of the Twentieth century before "railroading" on the Grand Trunk Pacific line had been spoiled by the laying of the rails was delivered yesterday afternoon before the Prince Rupert Gyo Club at its regular weekly luncheon by M. A. Burbank, district engineer for the Canadian National Railways. Major Burbank recounted a number of interesting anecdotes of his experiences as a locating engineer on the Grand Trunk Pacific in Saskatchewan around the year 1905. In those times railroading meant plenty of work but there was also plenty of fun. Money was abundant and men slept well at nights.

The period between 1903 and 1912 Major Burbank described as the time in the history of the North American continent when railroading was at its peak. In Canada the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern transcontinental lines were being rushed from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coast. In the United States the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Great Northern and Northern Pacific were being constructed across the continent. Everyone talked railroading and there was great optimism and enthusiasm. At the same time the Panama Canal was under construction but no one seemed to realize the damage that the canal was destined to do to the transcontinental railways and the freight business of which it would deprive them.

The luncheon was presided over by W. H. Tobey, president of the club, who recalled how Major Burbank and himself had landed first in Prince Rupert on Christmas Day 1906. In May the same year J. H. Pillsbury had landed here and, as far as he (Mr. Tobey) knew, the three of them were the "oldest old timers" still resident here. During the meeting Rev. W. D.
