# PUBLIC AID FOR MINING IS PLANNED

## PATTULLO SPONSORS STEWART RAILWAY CHARTER BILL

### Canadian Northeastern May Be Given Further Time to Put In Line

Government Would be Empowered to Extend Period For Completion Up to Five Years Provided it is Satisfied Work is Proceeding With Dispatch

VICTORIA, March 28: (CP)—Despite the refusal last week of the private bills committee to approve the application, Premier T. D. Pattullo, in the Legislature yesterday, introduced a bill which would extend for one year the charter of the Canadian Northeastern Railway Co.

### "ONLY FEW MILLIONS"

Would be Federal Loss If McFarland Liquidated on Wheat, Says Bennett

OTTAWA, March 28: (CP)—The federal treasury would lose "only a few millions" with \$13,000,000 an outside estimate, if John I. McFarland of Winnipeg suddenly liquidated his Dominion-backed wheat operations, the House of Commons was told last night by Premier Bennett.

### PUTTING IN TRAM LINE

Lumber and Other Material Being Shipped From Vancouver For Stewart Mine

William Dann, managing director of the Gold and Silver Mining Co. Ltd., is a passenger aboard the Prince George today returning to Stewart after attending the annual general meeting of the company in Vancouver. Mr. Dann told the meeting that about a month ago work was commenced on the cutting of the right-of-way for the aerial tram line. The tram was already on the ground and lumber and heavy hardware and other supplies would leave Vancouver in a few days for use in construction of terminals and warehouse. The lower terminal of the tramline is to be located on the Bear River road about two miles from the town of Stewart. The tram will be 6,300 feet in length with a single span. The portal of the tunnel is 2,600 feet above the road.

**Work Progressing**  
A compressor of 260 cubic feet capacity operated by a 50 h.p. motor together with steel sharpener and other equipment has been installed at the mine and all buildings are electrically lighted. Powder and all supplies necessary to carry on work for the next two months are at the mine. The main tunnel is in 396 feet and an average distance of eight feet per day is being made. Two shifts are being worked.


Reporting on work which was commenced on the property on August 1 last, Mr. Dann gave detailed information in regard to the workings of the mine and the assays secured all of which went to show that there is a real mine in the making at Stewart with the prospect of shipping ore in quantity this year.

G. Nelles Stacey was added to the board to represent Colonel Victor Spencer and associates. Other members of the board include William Dann, president; Brig. Gen. V. W. Odium, H. I. Bird and J. A. Parker, the secretary.

### Why Europe Fears Threat of Nazi Unification



This map tends to show why European statesmen believe that Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany will be responsible if a new war comes to Europe, and why Europe fears Hitler's program of unifying all German peoples. The figures shown in the various countries represent the estimate of German map makers as to the number of Germans in Europe—85,263,000. Foreign newspaper correspondents assert that there are enough Germans in each country—more than 20,000,000 outside of the Reich—to cause diplomats to be deeply disturbed at the prospect that some day Hitler or someone else may attempt to unite all these Germans into one nation.

### ROUMANIA ATTITUDE

New Haven For Insull is Believed Found—No Extradition Treaty With United States

BUCHAREST, Roumania, March 28: (CP)—New expectations that Samuel Insull sr., former Chicago utilities magnate, who is a fugitive from justice in the United States and who is now reported to be proceeding by ship through the Bosphorus, might be permitted to land in Roumanian soil were aroused today by a mysterious change in attitude of the Roumanian government.

It is explained here that there is no extradition treaty between Roumania and the United States and, therefore, it is said that the Roumanian government is not likely to be in a position to prevent Insull from landing if he chooses to do so.

### SPARKS ON DRY ROOF

Further Particulars of Fire Which Destroyed Port Essington Church Property

Provincial Constable Robert Gibson returned to the city last night after making an investigation of the circumstances of the fire last Sunday afternoon which destroyed the old and new United Church buildings at Port Essington as well as the minister's residence. The fire started from sparks flying from the church chimney on to the dry shingles of the roof. There was a brisk northerly wind blowing at the time and this was soon fanned into a roaring blaze which entirely consumed the three buildings. When the fire bell started to ring, the townsfolk thought it was the bell for Sunday School and did not respond to the alarm as usual. The blaze, therefore, had obtained a strong hold before it was generally known that there was a fire. Had the wind been blowing in the opposite direction the whole town might have been destroyed.

All that was saved was the furniture in the minister's residence. The property belonged to the United Church of Canada and the loss will run into several thousand dollars. It is not known if there was insurance. The newest of the three buildings was at least ten years old.

VICTORIA, March 28: (CP)—James T. Taylor, aged 69, member of a local bakery firm, died on Monday.

### Special Powers Act Is Given Third Reading By 34-13 Vote Today

Amendments By G. G. McGeer and R. W. Bruhn Rejected—Every Member of House Was in Seat For Main Division

VICTORIA, March 28: (CP)—The Special Powers Act of the British Columbia government was given third reading in the Legislature today, the vote being 34 to 13 in its favor with every member in his seat. An amendment introduced by G. G. McGeer, Liberal member for Vancouver-Burrard, to restrict the life of the Act until the commencement instead of the end of next session and subjecting everything done under the Act to possible action by the next session was defeated 34 to 12. An amendment introduced by R. W. Bruhn, Independent member for Salmon Arm, seeking to strike from the Act Clause 8 referring to property and civil rights was defeated by a vote of 13 to 30.

### NEW BILL DISCUSSED

Local Fisheries People Do Not Think Federal Measure Will Affect Them For Time Being at Least

In regard to the new National Products Marketing Act, which has been introduced in the House of Commons at Ottawa, local fish dealers are inclined to the belief that this legislation has been brought in more particularly to provide a means of dealing with the situation as affects the marketing of fruit in the Okanagan district of British Columbia over which the province has found it impossible to exercise control. It is not believed that it is the intention of the Dominion to apply such legislation to the fishing industry for the time being at least.

### Establishment of Ore Mills, One in North and Second In South, Urged on Government

VICTORIA, March 28: (CP)—Reporting as chairman of the select committee on mining to the Legislature yesterday, Dugald McPherson, Liberal member for Grand Forks-Greenwood, tabled a recommendation calling upon the government to give a broad general measure of assistance to prospecting and mineral development.

The report specifically recommended the establishment of two provincial ore mills, one in the north and one in the south, to test ores from small properties.
