THE B. C. BUDGET

The feature of the 1934 British Columbia budget introduced by Hon. John Hart yesterday was the announcement that the government would ask for authority to refund the B. C. debt at a rate to be set, probably from three to three and a half percent. This is following out the hustings promises of Premier Pattullo. It is in line with action proposed to be taken by other western provinces and also by the Dominion. If it goes through it will lift a tremendous load from the taxpayers and be the first step toward making the province solvent.

It was inevitable that the budget could not be a balanced Detroit one. British Imperial Arms Parley Planned Prior to World Gathering To Be Held Next Year

Naval Bill Passes

House of Commons Approves Increased Ontlay on Warship Construction

LONDON, March 13: - After hearing a proposal that an Imperial Defence Conference be held between the Mother Country and the various Dominions prior to the world naval conference planned to be held in 1935, the House of Commons, by an overwhelming majority yesterday, passed the government's naval estimates of £56,000,000, an increase of £3,000,000 over last year which would bring the British navy closer to treaty strength.

The suggestion was offered to the House that the Imperial naval conference should be held primarily for the purpose of determining a minimum naval strength for the Ladies' doubles-Miss C. Mitchell Empire. The view was expressed that the Dominions should now be in a position to contribute on ; larger scale to naval defence.

While the government has announced that it has been forced by the diffidence of other nations to accept disarmament proposals to adopt a policy of increasing its own defences, hopes are still expressed in many quarters that Great Britain may yet succeed in its efforts towards bringing about general disarmament in the interests of world Men's singles-L.
