That of Ex-Mayor C. H. Orme First To Be Heard and Decision In It May Affect Others

The appeal of Ex-Mayor C. H. Orme against the valuation placed upon the southwest double corner on Third Avenue at Fulton Street by City Commissioner W. J. Alder, sitting recently as a court of revision on the municipal assessment roll, was beng heard in County Court this morning by Judge W. E. Fisher. Mr. Orme's property was valued originally at \$5700 by the assessor but the court of revision granted him a reduction to \$5000 with which he is still not satisfied.
