

EXPLORER Capt. J. E. Bernier, Now Dead, Did Much Work For Canada In ain Joseph Elzear Bernier, celeated French-Canadian Arctic, exclerer, who died here on Wednesday

Capt. Bernier for years conducted Arctic exploratory work for the Canadian government, reaching hany remote points seldom if ever visited by white men. One of the imbitions of his life was to visit the North Pole but he never achieved his desire.

Much of the work of claiming Arctic regions for Canada fell to Captain Bernier. The Captain in his capacity as explorer for the departnent of interior, Ottawa, made 12 trips to the Arctic Islands, during which he planted the Canadian flag on many of them. The Captain, in the course of 60 years as a seafaring man, covered nearly 500,000 miles in his trips and during this time was master of 107 ships.
