NEW YORK, Feb. 10:-Following 16 the heavy selling movement which swept the market on Wednesday 3.00 when all groups of securities, with 9.00 the exception of metals, suffered their sharpest reaction since November, the downward movement 1.40 of stocks was checked on the New 25 York Exchange Thursday with a 62 lively rally and forenoon losses were largely cancelled, many issues substituting gains. Gold and silver mining issues registered better than any other group.

Thursday's closing averages were up from those of Wednesday which Saturday, Feb. 10, 1934 were as follows: industrials, 107.95, off 2.29; rails, 50.94, off 1.66; utilities, 29.71, off 1.32, and bonds, 90.73, off .49. The turnover on Wednesday was 4,500,000 shares
