#### POPPIES

Once again we are approaching the anniversary of the cessation of hostilities; and Remembrance Day reminds us of what feeling of gratitude surged through the hearts of the people of the world when at last peace was a fact.

Poppies for remembrance!

When one remembers the sacred associations connected with this emblem he does not pause to consider what other reasons may impel him to purchase it. But there is a definite contribution to the needy returned man and his dependents in the purchase of each poppy. The poppies are made by disabled returned men, so disabled as to be totally unfit to earn their living in any capacity. The first Red Cross Workshop was started in Victoria in 1921 but since then other shops have been started, some reorganizations have been effected and the poppies are now the product of Veterans shops still carried on by disabled soldiers.

The local branch buys all its poppy wreaths and poppies from the Veterans workshops. All expense of advertising, cartage, operation, etc. is met from the general funds of the branch so that every cent obtained over and above the price of the poppies is available for the returned man or his family whose case deserves consideration.

During the past year many families have been helped, clothing provided, hospital comforts supplied, medicines purchased, and so when you purchase your poppy or wreath you are repaying in some degree the debt we all owe to those who offered themselves for their country when their country needed it. Surely their country will see they do not go comfortless.



## INDOMITABLE MISSIONARY

Most Rev. Isaac O. Stringer Was  
Real "Apostle of the North"

### Long in Yukon

Eminent Divine of Anglican Church  
Was Well Known Here

The Most Rev. Isaac O. Stringer, B.A., D.D., who died suddenly in Winnipeg yesterday, will go down in history as the indomitable missionary spirit who in the course of his ministry in Canada's extreme northwest endured such hardships that on at least one occasion he was reduced to such straits for food that he chewed his moccasins for the oil they contained.

Archbishop Stringer spent almost all of his active life in the north country. The Diocese of the Yukon over which he had jurisdiction for so many years included the whole of the Northwest Territories west of the Rocky Mountains between British Columbia and the Arctic Ocean.

A man of tremendous spirit and powerful physique he often endured hardships he would not permit his subordinates to share. He felt a great respect for the simple people among whom he labored and his striking and genial personality impressed all those with whom he came in contact.

Archbishop Stringer was born April 10, 1886, in Kincardine Township, Bruce County, Ont. He attended public and high schools. He secured the degree of B.A. from Toronto University and graduated from Wycliffe College in 1892.

Immediately after graduation, Archbishop Stringer went as a missionary to the Eskimos in the Arctic Circle on Herschel Island and the mouth of the Mackenzie River. The following year he was appointed rector of Whitehorse, Yukon, where he remained until his consecration as bishop in 1905.

#### Saw North Change

Archbishop Stringer saw many changes in his great diocese of 200,000 square miles. When he first went to the Yukon the population was chiefly native with a few white fur traders and an occasional prospector. Then came the great Klondyke gold rush in 1896. For a time fortune hunters from everywhere flocked to the Yukon. The excitement of the gold rush passed and since then the population has fluctuated greatly. Today there are about 3,000 white and fifteen hundred natives in the Canadian Yukon.

In 1905 the Honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on Archbishop Stringer by St. John's College, Winnipeg. In 1895 Archbishop Stringer married Miss Sadie Alexander of Kincardine, Ont., who shared the arduous life of the missionary. Four sons and one daughter were born of the union.

Archbishop Stringer was a member of the Masonic and other fraternal organizations. His recreations were all of the most vigorous variety and included such strenuous pastimes as snowshoeing, curling, canoeing, dog sled driving and gardening.

Archbishop Stringer, who was well known in Prince Rupert through frequent visits here while he was Bishop of the Yukon, moved to Winnipeg some two years ago on being elevated to the post of Archbishop of Rupert's Land.

Archbishop Stringer's death is announced to have been due to heart disease.

## Pulp and Paper Magnate Passes

Edward W. Backus Dies Suddenly  
In New York at Age of  
Seventy-Four

NEW YORK, Oct. 31: (CP)—Edward Wellington Backus, who had extensive pulp and paper and lumbering interests in Ontario and Minnesota, died suddenly here at the age of seventy-four years. Not long ago his interests were estimated to be worth eighty million dollars. He was born in Jamestown, N.Y., but made his home in Minneapolis.

#### A SPLENDID ALTERNATIVE

Editor, Daily News:—

Surely sir, the "problem" you propound in your editorial relating to armaments is no problem at all. It is a common argument of militarists and their dupes in all countries that war-like preparations, among other benefits, create employment. Does not this argument indicate the desperate straits militarists and munition-makers are brought to in attempting to justify their profession and profits?

You say that men employed in producing arms are consumers but not producers, implying that because they do not produce in an over-stocked world their activities are beneficial. Would not this justification apply better to lunatic asylums? There, at least, the non-producing consumers are not creating fear and mistrust in the hearts of men, neither are they laying up great stores of horrible devices with which to destroy themselves and the rest of the world with them.

In place of guns and shells, why not road-making machinery and powder for blasting new roads—the Alaska-Washington road for instance; instead of poison-gas, tanks and battleships why not better public buildings, better educational facilities and encouragement of the arts?

Observe what could be done in Prince Rupert with the money spent on one small item of the world's armament, the "Skeena." The sewage system could be completed, a fine public hall and swimming-pool constructed, the public library enlarged and endowed for the constant provision of new books—the well being of every person in the city increased.

Is it not time we deafened our ears to the fatalistic gospel of the military men and the crafty propaganda of their consorts, the munition-makers? We need today the optimistic idealism of the builder, the constructor and the educator, and the men with the gospel of death should be silenced.

No Canadians But Many Americans

NEWMARKET, Eng., Oct. 31: (CP)—The favorite, Wychwood Abbott, won the classic Cambridgeshire Stakes horse race today with Commander III second and Highlander third in a field of thirty-three starters. The race was the most exciting in the ninety-five year history of the big handicap.

DUBLIN, Oct. 31: (CP)—No Canadians drew tickets in the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes on today's Cambridgeshire Handicap on either first, second or third horses which carry the major prizes.

Three Americans were each \$150,000 wealthier by the victory of Wychwood Abbott, Mrs. E. Fenz of Maspeth, Long Island, M. M. Nesson of Astoria, Long Island, and an unidentified New Yorker holding tickets. Eight tickets on Commander III, the second horse, were held in the United States, each paying \$75,000, while four were held on Highlander, each being worth \$50,000.
