PLAIN AND STRIPED VOILE



Black and white striped voile is tremendously popular, and when used with a plain color is doubly attractive. In this instance the plain voile was a lovely shade of violet, and the buttons on either side of the bodice black velvet.

Breakfast Popovers

For popovers at breakfast mix 1 cup of flour, quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, three-quarters of a cup of milk, and the yolk of 1 egg. Add the milk gradually to the flour, beating out the lumps while it is thick. Add half a teaspoonful of melted butter, and the stiffly beaten white of the egg. Butter gem tins of either tin or iron, have very hot, fill about two-thirds full and bake in a hot oven.

What to Wear

Wear an evening gown to an "at-home" or any pretty house dress with lace yoke. Wear a long coat or a short one, but don't stay home because you haven't an evening cloak. Everyone will not be dancing. A pretty color would be soft grey or some pretty shade of champagne or yellow, or else black. Have it made with high waist line, narrow skirt, surplice waist, and sleeves about the elbow.

Escalloped Asparagus

Mix a tablespoonful of butter and one of flour, add a half-cupful of cream, cook until the mixture thickens. Beat six eggs, stir in, but do not let come to a boil, season with salt and pepper. Butter a pudding dish, put first a layer of the sauce, then a layer of cooked asparagus until the dish is nearly full. Cover the top with frothed white of the egg, then with grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven and serve hot.

Cleaning Hats

To clean a black straw hat, first brush well, then give it a coat of good shoe blacking, or else get hat dye or hat enamel at one of the big departmentals. To clean a white felt hat there is nothing better than Fuller's earth. Rub in well, leave a day, then brush out thoroughly.

LOVELY WOMAN!

Rich Parisian Ladies Change Dresses Ten Times in Twenty Four Hours.

"The women of Paris are dress mad," declared Charles C. Kurman, a New York milliner who has just returned on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm II. "Among them is great competition as to who will wear the newest gowns. Every woman wants to be the first at the races with a new gown. There is great extravagance in Paris among the dressy rich."

"Parisian women who consider themselves smart, dress from eight to ten times during the twenty-four hours. First, in the morning they dress for riding in the Bois de Boulogne; second, they dress for breakfast; third, they dress for shopping; fourth, they dress for a walk in the Avenue des Acacias; fifth, they dress for luncheon, which they take at the Chateau Madrid; sixth, they dress for the races; seventh, they dress for tea at the Pre Catelain; eighth, they dress for dinner at Armoneville; ninth, they dress for the Vienn opera, or for the Enghien Les Bains, a miniature Monte Carlo; tenth, they dress for supper, which fashionable Paris now takes at the Cafe de Paris, and eleventh, if you please, they change for bed."

"The average cost of these gowns is \$250. Ten different gowns would cost for one day alone, \$2,500."

"Now, figuring that seldom do these women wear the same gown more than once a week, those in the swim would have to have sixty gowns."

"There is a craze for fringe on everything—dresses, hats, handbags, parasols and every article a woman wears and carries. Paris is fringe crazy."

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ITEMS OF SPORT

The sixteen members of the Waseda baseball club have sailed for Japan after completing a tour of the United States.

Johnny Lush is some versatile ball-tosser. He can pitch well enough to beat most Eastern League teams any time, plays the outfield nicely, and the plays he made at first base on Saturday were great. With the bat Johnny is a bear.

Because officers of the Brooklyn National league baseball club gave Pitcher Ragon permission to play an exhibition game at Long Branch, N. J., the club was fined \$50 by the National baseball commission. The rule under which this action was taken was made in the first place at the instance of President Ebbetts of Brooklyn himself.

Another round up of "white hopes" is planned with a view to picking a challenger of World Champion Jack Johnson. The National Sporting Club of America has issued an invitation to heavyweights.

Managers of the different ball clubs in the Northwestern League are responsible in a large degree for the actions of their players. If the rules covered the case, the managers would be fined as well as the players. When George Ort struck Umpire Baumgarten, that reflected on the ability of Manager Tighe to control his men. The Naps have recalled five players "farmed" in the spring. The players are: Ed. Hohnhorst, with Toledo; Jack Adams, with Memphis; Benjamin Demott, with Omaha; and Henry Knaupp and Dave Callahan, with New Orleans. They will report at the close of the seasons of their respective leagues.

A deal has been put through whereby Pitcher Cy Pieh of the Eskimos goes to Brandon in return for Pitcher Heinrichs.

It pays to have a star performer on a baseball team. At St. Paul a crowd of 10,000—largest of the season—was brought out to the park by the announcement that Mary O'Toole, "\$22,500" beauty, would pitch.

The leadership of the National league has fallen into the hands of Pittsburgh. This is the first time this season that the world's champions of 1919, have touched the top rung of the 1911 standing.

There is a touch of pathos in the story of the Cardinals' great hunt for the National League pennant. All over the circuit, Roger's team is the favorite next to the home club, but the older fans, singing the praises of the Climbers, never fail to remark: "It's too bad poor Stanley Robison never lived to see them."

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
