WASHINGTON, D.C., March 21 -United States Army planes resumed air mail service over eight routes this week. Service is being carried out on about a quarter of the scale which was provided before the cancellation last month of the contracts of the private companies. Army mail flyers are now given the complete privilege of making final decision individually as to the advisability and safety of going up on any mail flight. They are specifically ordered not to take off unless there is at least a 3000
