PROFITEERS ARE PLAYED

Hon. Charles Stewart Charges Manufacturers With Exploiting Depression

OTTAWA, February 1 (Canadian Press)—Hiding behind tariff protection, some Canadian manufacturers have made excessive profits through the depression yet have paid the lowest wages in history to their employees. It was charged in the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. Charles Stewart of Edmonton West, formerly Liberal minister of the interior.

"I am credibly informed," Mr. Stewart said, "and I am going to ascertain the truth of the matter, that in Western Ontario there is an individual engaged in the production of silk stockings and silk underwear who stands to make a profit well over \$200,000 this year and he is paying the lowest wages he ever paid."
