WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Capt. Ben Peterson, Norman Starvick, Herman Leland, Anton Martinussen, Harold Helland and Alf Jacobsen, members of the crew of the halibut boat Tahoma, which has been seized by the United States Coastguard and is being held at Ketchikan on charges of violation of the marine laws in that she allegedly operated as an American vessel while being owned and operated by Canadian interests, arrived in the city from the Alaska city on the Prince Maquinna yesterday afternoon. Members of the crew of the Tahoma were allowed their liberty by the American authorities, the boat itself being held pending libel proceedings. It is alleged that the skipper of the Tahoma was the only American on board, two members of the crew being Norwegian subjects and the other three Canadians.

Returning south after a special voyage to Skagway with a large cargo of coal and explosives, C. P. R. steamer Princess Maquinna, Capt. William Palmer, arrived here at 4:45 yesterday afternoon from the north and sailed an hour later for Vancouver via Ocean Falls. The vessel had on board thirty-six passengers of whom fourteen disembarked here. Coming south the Princess Maquinna called at Juneau, Wrangell and Ketchikan. It was her first call here in many years and her first trip to Skagway in two decades. The vessel is regularly operated on the West Coast of Vancouver Island run.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, which is undergoing overhaul at the local dry dock preparatory to being recommissioned on the Queen Charlotte Island run, was taken on the pontoons yesterday for hull work.

Northland Transportation Co's motorship Northland, Capt. Len Williams, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging seven carloads of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Seattle.

C.N.R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Needen, arrived in port at 11:15 this morning from Van-

couver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 10 o'clock tonight for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow night southbound. The vessel brought north a fair-sized list of passengers.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 11:45 yesterday morning from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 2:30 in the afternoon for Vancouver and way-points advertised at 2:30 in the afternoon with passengers on leaving here for the south, many having been attracted by a special round trip excursion fare from here to Vancouver.
